

Plan to Arrest Man Who Did Not Appear As Inquest Witness

Arrest of George Peterson, who formerly resided at 4865 Winthrop avenue, Chicago, on charges growing out of his part in the collision of an automobile and motorcycle which resulted in the death of Spencer B. Hunnewell, of Milwaukee, on Green Bay road near Waukegan in November, will be recommended by the coroners jury at the close of the inquest into the death last week.

Efforts to locate Peterson have been of no avail. He was allowed to leave the city on his promise to return in time for the inquest, but he failed to appear at the hearing. He was sought in Chicago, where it was stated that he had moved to Milwaukee.

Hunnewell was killed instantly when his motorcycle and a sedan driven by Peterson met in a head-on collision that threw Hunnewell through the windshield of Peterson's car. It is claimed that Peterson had cut out around another car to pass it and then crashed into a ford machine. It then rebounded and struck the motorcycle.

Robert Drake, of 6355 Fourteenth st., Kenosha, who drove the Ford appeared at the inquest, along with A. G. Heath, who was with him at the time of the accident and cleared himself of liability in the crash.

As a World war veteran you have inherited \$6,500 by virtue of your war-time service. Do you realize what a grateful government has to offer you in recognition of your services in the World War?

Do you know that if you are in need of hospitalization, that the U. S. Veterans' Bureau will grant you FREE hospitalization, which includes room, board, doctor's care, surgical care, nurse's care, medicine, physical examinations, X-ray pictures, electrical treatments—in fact, FREE treatment for every known disease?

Do you know that you are also entitled to free railroad or auto transportation to a government hospital and free return trip home? Do you know that in case an ambulance is needed to transport you to the hospital, or to a railroad station in making the trip to a government hospital that this is also furnished as well as an attendant to accompany you, if your condition is such as to warrant it?

Do you know that in case of your death in a government hospital, that your body will be prepared for burial and transportation will be paid to your home? Do you know that the Government will also pay the transportation and subsistence of an attendant to accompany your body home?

Do you know that in case of your death outside of a government institution, and you do not leave net assets in excess of \$100.00 after payment of all debts contracted before death, that you are entitled to \$107.00 towards your funeral expenses from the U. S. Government? Do you know that you are entitled to a free headstone from the government for your grave in the event of your death?

All of the above is offered to you FREE, regardless of whether or not your disability is incident to your World war service.

Disability Compensation

Do you know that if your disability is due to service you are then entitled to receive compensation in amounts varying from \$10 to \$100 per month, according to the degree of disability? Do you know that in case your death is caused by a disability incident to your service, that your dependents would be entitled to dependency compensation? Do you know that if you die while receiving compensation from the government, that you are entitled to the sum of \$107, payable towards your funeral expenses, regardless of your financial status?

Do you know that if you have failed to apply for your adjusted compensation in the form of a free, paid-up, 20-year endowment life insurance policy, with a value up to \$1,585, that that this privilege has been reinstated? Do you know that in case of your death before the 20 years has elapsed, that the face value of this policy would be payable to the designated beneficiary? If you wish further information, remember— all this has been secured for you through the efforts of The American Legion.—The Illinois Legionnaire.
