

N. S. Line to Manage Chicago Region Tours

A new feature in specialized service to the public has been inaugurated by the North Shore Line and associated public utilities companies serving the Chicago metropolitan area with organization of the Metro-Land tours department as a branch of the Outing and Recreation bureau.

The aim of this department is to furnish the public complete facilities in making trips to interesting places and events throughout the greater Chicago region. All details of the trip, including itinerary, meals and

transportation, are made in advance, and parties are personally conducted if they so desire. With this complete service, groups of any size may visit any places in or near Chicago without the delays or inconveniences attending unprepared trips.

Walter C. Nielsen, who has had extensive experience in this field of public service, has been appointed manager of the new department, with offices at 72 West Adams street, Chicago. As explained by him, the new organization is prepared to give the public the same sort of service in the territory adjacent to Chicago as other large travel agencies furnish persons making world tours.

Cincinnati Takes Issue With Boston Preacher Who Is Just Talking

But he is whistling down the wind when he attacks the Daughters of the American Revolution which is bent upon keeping alive the storied traditions of a great day and compelling the adequate defense of the land their forbears won from the tyranny of misrule. So long as this organization endures in America, patriotism can never be made odious. So long as it endures the "intellectual" and sentimental emotionalists so presently abundant in American pulpits and make little headway in their labor of damning America and extolling the virtues of comradeship with peoples who would like no better task than the cutting of all Christian throats.

These American internationalists are, in fact, rank enemies of democracy, of the institutions and ideals of the land which shelters them; they are engaged in influencing certain types of men in the public service with their blatant emotionalism, which holds no element of rational thought. They do not represent American life.

Dempsey Expected at Fort Sheridan Boxing Show Given this Eve

Barrington Man Dies in Crossing Accident
