Wilmot School P. T. A. Holds Interesting Meeting, January 17

The Wilmot School P. T. A. held its regular meeting at the school on the afternoon of Friday, Jan. 17. Though it was cold and stormy the attendance was very good.

First in order were the minutes of the last meeting and the treasurer's report. The president, Mrs. Hopkins, told of an invitation extended to join with the Deerfield-Shields high school in April and hear a special speaker at that time.

Mrs. E. J. Ginter sang two numbers "Sweet Little Mother of Mine," and "Just Hold My Hands Tonight."

Mrs. Hopkins introduced the speakers, Mrs. H. P. Burnside of the League of Women Voters, and Mrs. W. A. Kendrick, president of the Central School P. T. A. of Wilmette. Both gave very interesting talks. Mrs. Burnside spoke first, and her talk was somewhat of a report on "Legislation Affecting Children." She spoke of the following: Child Labor Laws, Compulsory Education, State Aid for Defective Children, State Distribution fund, State System of Certificates for Higher Standards for Teachers, Department of Education with a secretary in the President's cabinet to direct and help, Hygiene Laws, Consolidation of Schools. She said Illinois has 10142 one room schools, which is more than the number of like schools in any other one state, and also more school districts. By consolidation they want to reduce this number to 3000 schools.

The state distribution fund is now ten million dollars and it must be raised to thirteen million. This fund goes to help schools wherever it is most needed. The distribution fund, the hygiene law and a few other issues will come up again in 1931, and need our support. We should all be certain how our senators and representatives stand on these issues and how they vote.

She also mentioned raising the age of consent from 16 to 18 years, and of jury service for women, and said it is up to women to see that these bills are put through.

Mrs. Kendrick spoke on the "Psychology of the Home." She said the home should have the most to do with children—much more than other influences outside. That parents should know where children are and what they are doing, and there should be a partnership of parents to care for children and talk things over. Surround the child with beauty, a home from the entrance all the way through; make it a unit orderly and attractive.

She spoke of the Child Welfare Magazine now having a department of parent education and said it classed homes as being good or worthy, bad or unworthy, and drifting. Environment counts and children react to their surroundings. An important factor is in the fellowshipping with your children and talking over all your problems with them. The sex obli-
