SAYS SKATING AND DIGNITY DON'T MIX

Another Dissertation by Ravinia Rink Booster; Support Urged For This Project

Psychological smokescreens just do not register on the ice. Some time ago George Ade wrote about "dignity" as follows:

George Ade on "Dignity"

"When a man cannot be anything else he can be dignified. Dignity is the sure-fire asset of the twenty-two calibers.

"The physiognomy must be stern and rockbound. It is better to wear dark clothes. The vox humana should be keyed low.

"Nine times out of 10, a godlike demeanor may be regarded as a facade of a Greek temple opening abruptly into a one-room bungalow. Dignity was invented to mask the absence of works. Some men are silent while brooding over the solemnities of life, and others are silent because they have nothing to pass out through the window.

"Only those who have moral courage can stand out in the presence of dignity, and be frivolous and deliberately normal."

relieve Sheridan road of through traffic, property owners along Sheridan road should be assessed to aid in paying for the improvement.

Hearing Continued

Following quite a lengthy discussion, in which the mayor explained that the estimate was always higher than the eventual cost, as no bids above the estimate could be accepted, but that usually they were much below, it was decided to continue the hearing for a week, when the matter will have further consideration.

Amended Zoning Ordinance

The amended zoning ordinance which has been under way for some months was presented to the council and filed for consideration without discussion. It makes more definite some of the provisions regarding non-conforming uses, lodging houses, rooming houses and apartments. It will be considered at length later.

The Volunteers of America were accorded privilege of holding their annual tag day, the date of which will be definitely set later.

A communication regarding dangerous traffic conditions on Bloom street was referred to Commissioner Brown for investigation and report.

On motion, Jacob L. Crane was employed to finish the city planning project at total compensation of \$3,000, of which \$600 is to be paid this year and \$2,400 next year.

Commissioner Reay presented bills and payrolls totaling \$33,958.36, which were ordered paid.

A report from Justice Herman Schwery showed fines amounting to \$461 to January 1. The report was accepted and placed on file.

The mayor and city clerk were authorized to enter into a contract with the Rubberstone Corporation for rubber stone flooring for the new city hall rooms, in accordance with their original bid.

The council rejected all bids on the proposed shore protection project and provided for readvertising for bids to be received February 12. Plans submitted by Pearse, Greeley & Hansen were approved.

Mayor Lewis appointed Edmund Eitel and Rev. Frank Fitt members of the Library board for the three year term ending July 1, 1932.
