### Sketch of Career

Later he went to Princeton university, Princeton, New Jersey, where he received a classical education, and was awarded on graduation the Fellowship of Modern History. 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## Dr. Nellie Seeds to Speak Here Tuesday

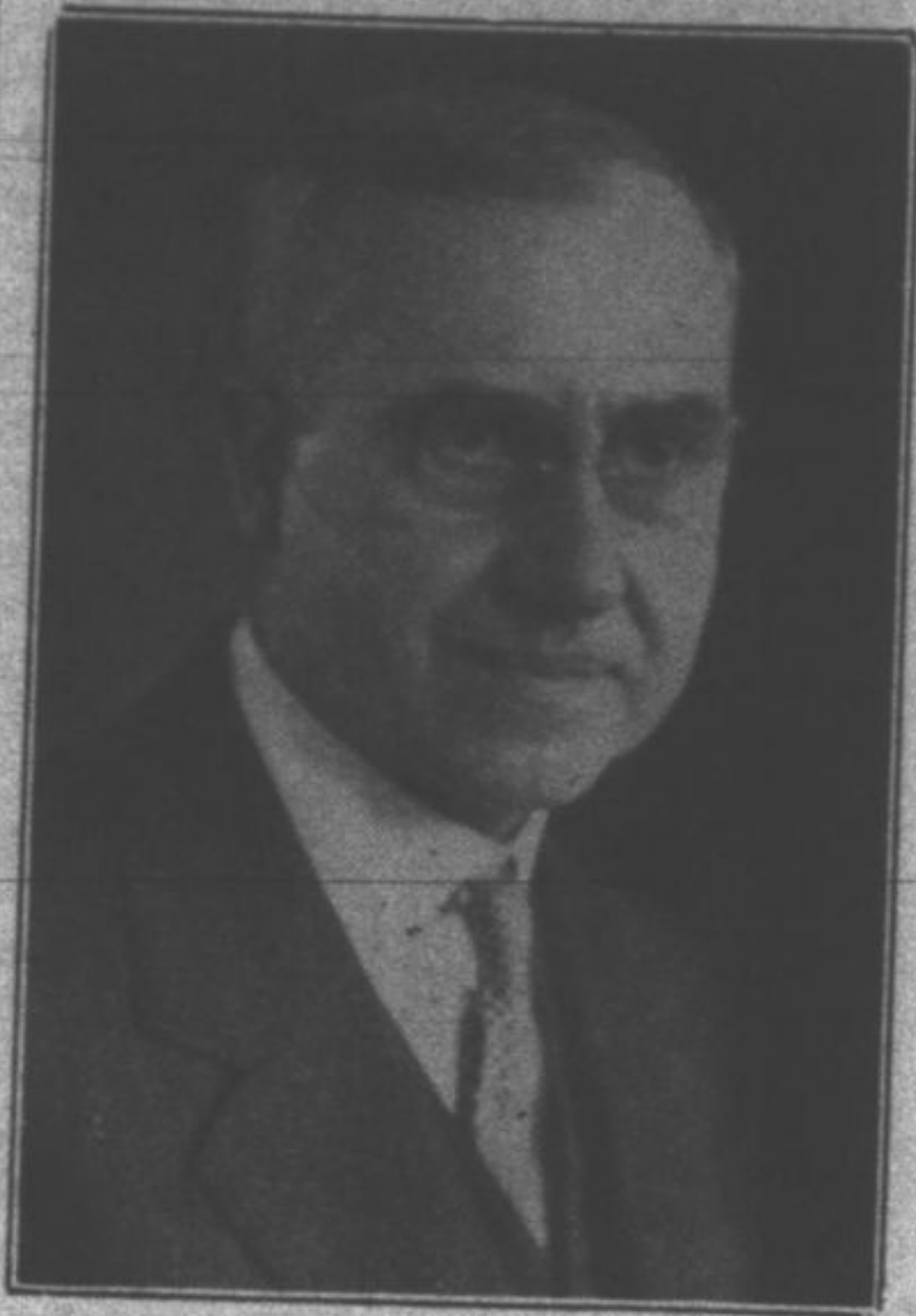
