### County Candidates May File Petitions Feb. 3, Hendee States

Candidates for county offices will not be able to file their petitions with County Clerk Lew A. Hendee prior to February 3 he ruled last week.

Attorney General Oscar Carlstrom had held that it would be legal to accept petitions February 1.

County Clerk Robert Sweitzer, of Cook county, got an opinion from Meyer, Mayer, Austrain & Platt, however, that caused him to set the date for filing in Cook county for February 3.

With the date set as February 3 everyone will be safe. No petitions can be ruled out later and it will give candidates ample time to file," Mr. Hendee stated.

The attorney general released a ruling about two weeks ago in hopes of easing the minds of county clerks through the state who felt that it would be illegal to accept petitions February 1.

### Lake Bluff Annexation Election Dates Fixed

Movement in the direction of the annexation of Lake Bluff to Lake Forest crystallized in to definite action Monday when Attorney Okel Euqua, representing 331 property owners in Lake Bluff, petitioned County Judge P. L. Persons to call elections in both Lake Forest and Lake Bluff.

The court fixed April 8 as the date for election in Lake Forest and April 15 for Lake Bluff.

The move to combine the two north shore cities was started late in the summer with a number of Lake Bluff residents showing keen interest in the proposal.

The filing of the petition does not come as an official act of either municipality but an action on the part of interested property owners in Lake Bluff according to Mr. Euqua.

### Lyons to Be Candidate for Legislature Again

Richard J. Lyons, of Mundelein, one of the state representatives from the 8th senatorial district, announced last week that he would be a candidate for a second term and that he would make the race on his record.

Rep. Lee McDonough, Waukegan, is to be a candidate as is Rep. N. L. Jackson, of Boon county.

McHenry county will have Supervisor Charles Palmer in the race and possible Attorney William A. Carroll, who made a strong bid for election two years ago.

Several others have been considered as possible candidates.
