and predicted that it would not reach a half-million including the cost of property to be condemned. The estimated cost of the actual street improvement, including widening, paving, curbing and installing storm sewers is given at \$238,000. This does not include the cost of condemning and acquiring property.

Objectors' Petition Filed

Attorney E. S. Gail presented a petition with 175 signatures opposing the project and spoke at length in behalf of his clients. City officials report that of the 175 signers, only 51 are property owners east of the tracks and north of Elm place and explain that the improvement is not to be made by general taxation.

When all objectors had been heard the hearing was continued until Monday evening, February 10.
