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ALTER SHERIDAN RD. EXTENSION PROJECT

Repeal Original Ordinance to Provide for Changes at Council Meeting

At the regular meetings of the city council and board of local improvements Monday evening an ordinance was submitted and passed repealing the original ordinance regarding the extension of Sheridan road southward to Laurel avenue, etc., and a new plan, in which some slight changes in location will be made is to be substituted.

In this connection a resolution was read and filed for inspection providing for the appointment of Bowen E. Schumacher as special counsel to act for the city and the board of local improvements in all proceedings necessary in acquiring and clearing a right of way and the construction of pavement, etc., in Central, Laurel and St. Johns avenues and in rights of way and easements to be acquired

Hubbard Woods Bank Held Up Wednesday; Bandits Get \$4,000

Two daring bandits held up officials and ten customers of the Hubbard Woods State bank Wednesday shortly after 9:30 a.m., and escaped with between \$3,000 and \$4,000 in cash, it was reported. They overlooked \$10,000 in large bills in the vault.

As the bandits sped away in a small coupe, bank employes who had been forced into a vault freed themselves and notified police of all the North Shore suburbs.

Motorcycle police from Evanston, Wilmette, Winnetka and Kenilworth, and detective bureau squads of Evanston and the north side of Chicago sped to cover all roads from the north to intercept the robbers.

As the bandits entered the bank one of them remained in front, while the other walked to the cashier's cage at the back of the bank. Then they whipped out revolvers from under coats and herded the bank employes and ten customers into the vault with the exception of Harold Mark, assistant cashier.

From him the bandits took his keys and opened all the money boxes in the bank. Scooping the money into a small black bag they carried, they marched Mark back to the vault, placed him inside and slammed the door. Then they ran out and sped south in their coupe.
