Give Delightful Presentation of
"Children of Moon" for
Woman's Club

The open meeting of the Highland Park Woman's club on Tuesday evening was a most delightful event. "Children of the Moon," by Martin Flavin, presented by the Garrick Players of Lake Forest College, under the direction of Russell C. Tomlinson, was splendidly produced by an unusual cast.

For a group of college students to interpret such characters and sustain such an atmosphere as this play demands, well enough to gain and hold the intense interest which this audience showed, is a real achievement. Added to the difficulty of interpretation and atmosphere is an additional one which the author imposes on his cast, that of lack of relief. In spite of the fact that the play is a monotone, the actors made the monotone interesting. Each character was given an understanding, sympathetic portrayal which made the presentation an outstanding one.
