There is an old saying to the effect that "all things look good when they're far away," Like other old sayings, there is a modicum of truth in this one-but that's another story, as Kipling says.

The point is that, while this aphorism may have certain merits, it is equally or more certain that the things which are ours possess, if they have any intrinsic desirability at all, a certain keen and personal appeal which we never find in the appurtenances of a stranger. Our children are always brighter; our house better planned; our club more exclusive; and our friends more entertaining than those of other people.

Even our town is a better place to live than are the less fortunate suburbs to the South and West-otherwise, as general proposition, we wouldn't be living here.

Our Hospital

I wonder how many of us ever stop to think that one of the things that make our town a thoroughly desirable place of residence is the fact that Our Hospital is within easy reach.

Years ago, a hospital used to be thought of as a sort of pest-housea half-way station on the way to the morgue, where people who had no friends to care for them might be sent to die. And, years ago, that idea was not so far wrong! But times have changed the conditions!

The days of long, bare, white wards, with long rows of stiff, white beds, like a barracks, are no more. Today, the rooms in a hospital look more or less like those in the home of somebody who is proud of her home -charming, restful places to stay and be taken care of by experts, if one has the misfortune to be ill.
