

P.T.A. TO HEAR ABOUT LA SALLE-PERU WORK

"What Can Education Really Accomplish for the Average Human Being?" is the subject of the talk which Mr. C. J. McCormick, principal of the LaSalle-Peru Township high school, will give at the next meeting of P. T. A. at Deerfield-Shields on Thursday, February 6, in the high school auditorium. This is the most important afternoon program of the year.

Mr. McCormick was the first principal in the state of Illinois to take up and diagnose student problems. In the LaSalle-Peru Township high school, students are given psychological examinations as soon as they enter, and a close contact is kept with each student in the course of his school years.

Mr. McCormick has become so successful in his work, that he has interested a large number of wealthy people of the community, who are extending contributions to him for carrying on work in the Institute of Juvenile Research for students who

have very difficult problems to be handled.

He is known to be very much interested in character development, articles of this nature frequently appearing in magazines. He is a humanist, and he has published a number of monographs on his work and the conclusions at which he has arrived in character citizenship training.

Census Supervisor to Visit Lake County in Organizing District

Development of an organization to take the 1930 federal census of Lake county will come to a definite head when Mrs. Estelle Northam of Evanston, supervisor for the third district, arrives in Waukegan about February 15 it is reported by Waukegan papers.

Prior to that time the supervisor intends to get in touch by letter with as many people as she can who she believes qualified to take a census.

Applications have been mailed to her already, she declared, and questionnaires will be sent to these people as soon as possible. If the questionnaires are satisfactory these prospective enumerators will be asked to take oral examinations at the Evanston headquarters.

Mrs. Northam, who has a large part of Cook county as well as Lake, believes that it will be necessary to retain at least one canvasser for each precinct which would call for 69 people in Lake county. The pay is to run from \$5 to \$8 daily and the work will start April 1.

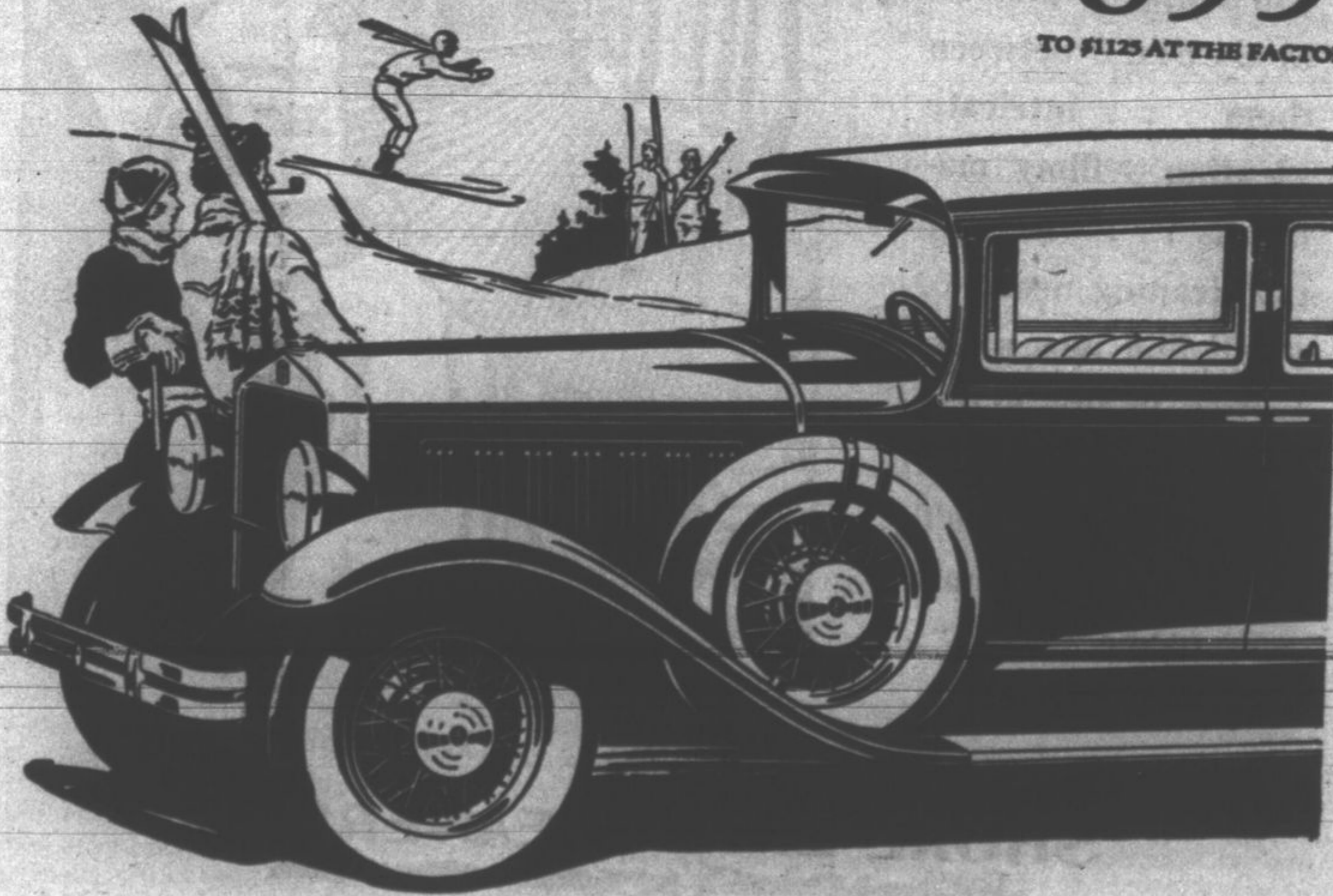
