So far, only small tracts have been purchased. State parks ought not to be small. They should take care of the tramping of thousands of feet without destroying the plant life. Naturally such parks cannot be of great width. Where the landscape is exceptionally fitting they may cover a good many miles, as for instance along the Mississippi and on the Illinois river. The state has purchased a few hundred acres of the Mississippi Palisades north of the city of Savanna—but most of the Mississippi bluffs from Savanna to the state line are of State Park character, and some of it well adopted to forestry. Most of these lands have no economic value in the way of farming. Whether adopted for forestry or parks they are a protection against erosion, and in that way a protection against floods.

On Illinois River

A sail on the Illinois river, south of Peoria, still reveals Illinois as the pioneer saw it and where one may feel the ageless beauty of the wilds. Just think what richness and beauty these protected river highways will give to mid-America, and what a lesson to the world. Here the vision grows and follows the current afar. Our rivers become the highways of our thoughts that may carry us to any point of the world. In the canyons away from the song of the machine and the rustle of the golden corn, the farm boy learns his lessons in music and poetry. Here he meets a world not of his making—a world of romance, beauty and history. Here he feels the footprints of his ancestors and the Indian before them.

Looking Into Future

Let us look into the future to the time when every inch of soil that can be cultivated is occupied by human habitation, when the villages have grown into towns and the towns into cities and the agricultural country has almost become a scattered village. Just think what these ribbons of primitive America—these river highways with their bluffs and canyons, their hills and valleys, will mean to the future American. Like the branches of a giant tree will these grand parkways of native beauty spread through our fertile prairies, carrying greetings from village to village and city to city. Let us begin now—begin generously—by purchase, easement or gift.
