
The second boxing show of the winter will take place here in the Post gymnasium at Fort Sheridan tonight at 8:15 p. m.

POSTPONE ST. JOHNS AVE. HEARING MONTH

Will Be Held March 10; New Plan Suggested in Petition; Council Meets

At the opening of the city council meeting Monday evening, Mayor Benjamin F. Lewis announced that it had become necessary to postpone further bearing on the St. Johns avenue extension project until March 10, because of new developments. He explained that a petition largely signed by property owners who would favor girls in Girl Scout troops now and the improvement had been received asking that the plan be altered to reduce the width of the street and the paving, and that consideration of this proposition would require additional

At the meeting of the Board of Local Improvements later in the evening formal action was taken providing for the postponement of the public hearing to March 10.

The council adopted the resolution, read first at the previous meeting, employing Bowen E. Schumacher as special counsel in the new project for the extension of Sheridan road southward from Central avenue. At the meeting of the board of local improvements the resolution originating the new plan, which reallocates the proposed extension, was adopted. The public hearing on this project is set for February 24.
