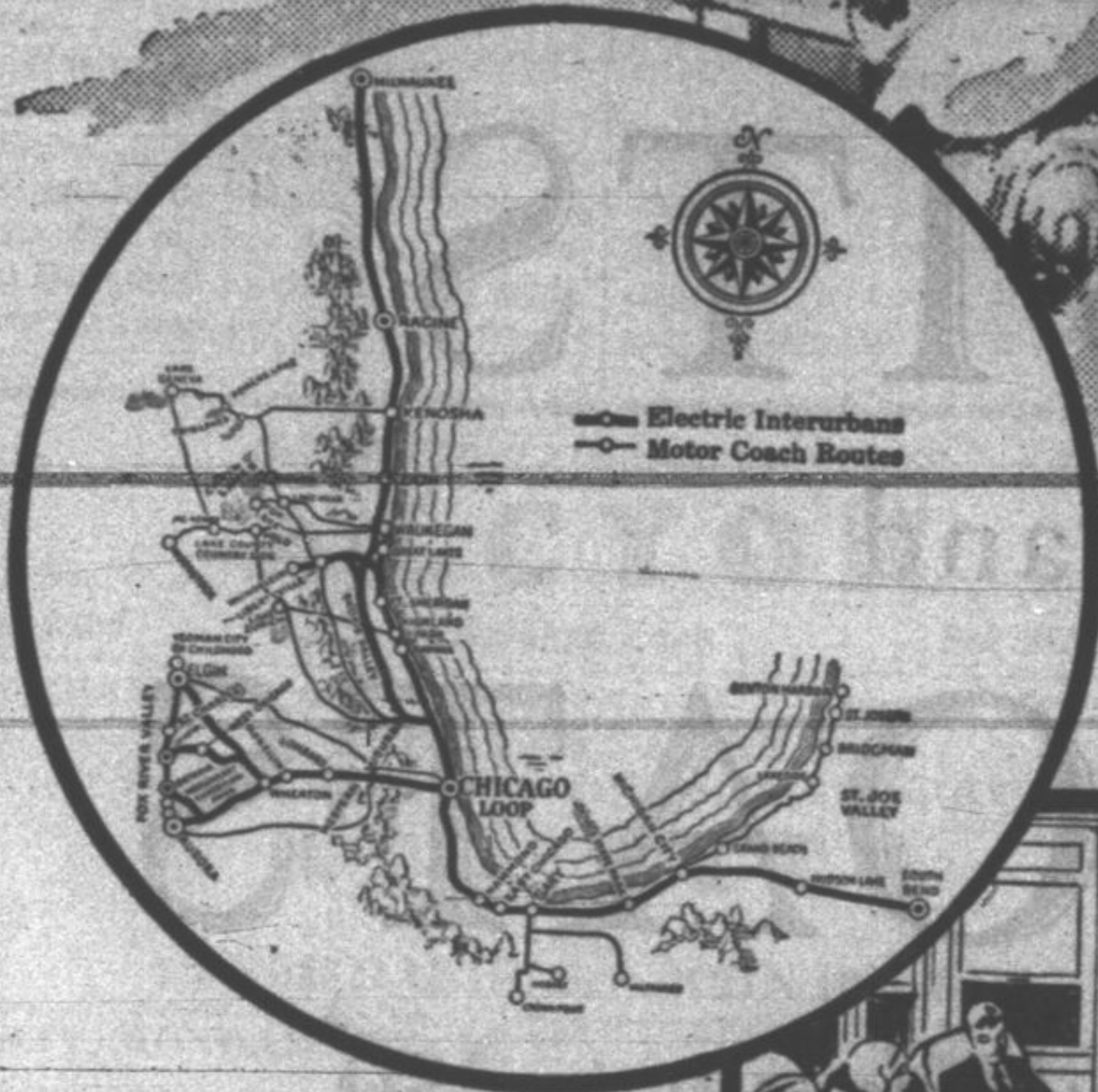

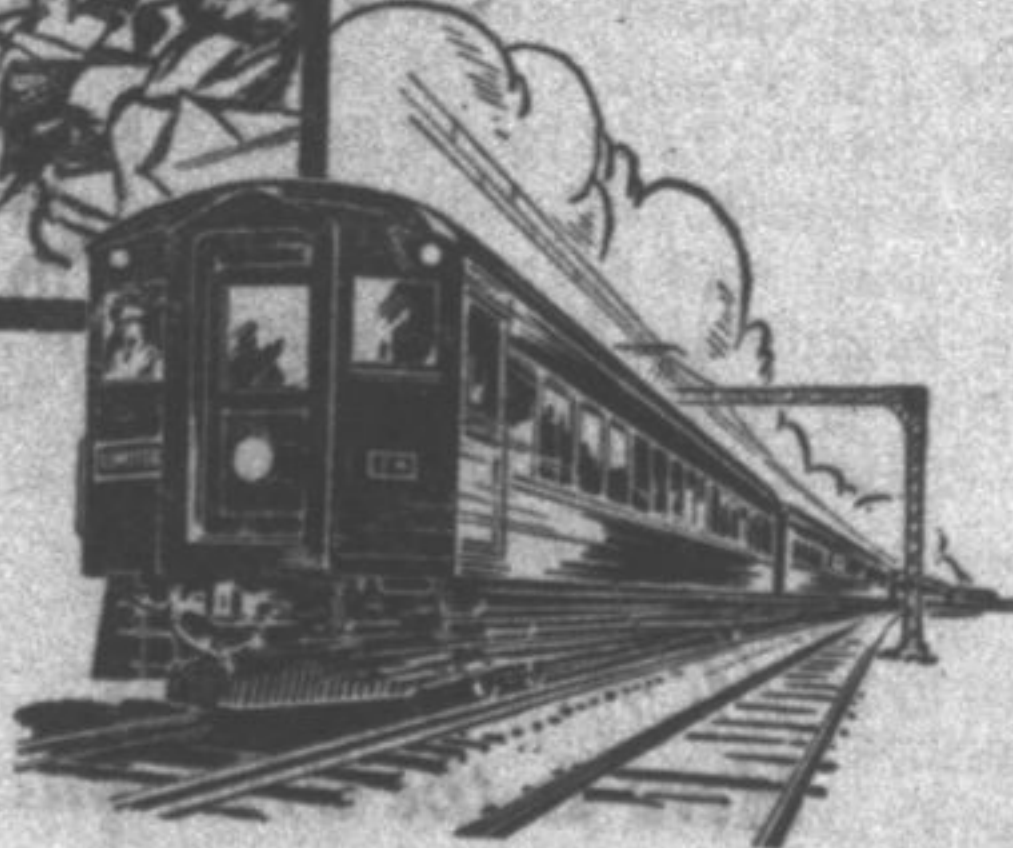

TEAM SHOWS REAL FIGHTING SPIRIT
