**District Mobilizations**  
All districts in the council held practice mobilizations on Saturday, February 8, during the afternoon. We do not have reports from all of these yet, but will by next week.

**Lake Forest**  
At 3:30 Saturday afternoon, the scoutmasters of troops in Lake Forest were called by Mr. Gilbert Porter, III. Five minutes later Troop 45 were all present except one boy that was sick in bed. Soon all the troops were there with a few missing out of the ranks. They were told of a cyclone in business district and dismissed to bring the patients back. Dr. Clifford P. McCullaugh checked the wards thoroughly, complimented and critized and gave a general talk on first aid. Chief Tiffany of the Lake Forest police gave a talk and the group dismissed at 4:45.

**Highwood**  
Troops 36 and 37 were called at 3:30, and one troop with 23 boys reported at the city hall in 12 minutes. The other troop arrived in a few minutes. They took the fire truck over to the Oak Terrace school, rescued and first aided numerous people from the byfothetical fire. The group then marched to the city hall with the color guards in front. A talk by fire chief Deber and one by Mayor Roth, scout commissioner completed the program.

**Highland Park Report**  
In conformity with instruction issued by the North Shore Area council office, the mobilization of Boy Scouts in the Highland Park district was held at 3:00 p. m., Saturday, February 8, 1930.

Notification of scoutmasters started promptly at 3:00 p. m. Place of meeting at Highland Park city hall. The large room on second floor being used for an emergency dressing station.

The first scout reported to me promptly at 3:14, being a member of troop 32. All scouts reporting were there at 3:30.

Troops reporting as follows:  
Troop 30, Scoutmaster Udell — 16 scouts, 5 stretchers.

Troop 32 Scoutmaster Brush—11 scouts, 2 stretchers, 1 first aid kit.

Troop 33, Scoutmaster Smith — 17 scouts, 3 stretchers, 4 extra blankets.

Troop 34, Assistant Scoutmaster Ericson—12 scouts, 2 stretchers, 9 first aid kits.

Troop 35, Scoutmaster Olson — 14 scouts, 3 stretchers, 5 first aid kits.

Total: 5 leaders, 70 scouts.

Sentries were placed around the affected district. Doctor, police and fire department notified. Each troop given at least two first aid problems to work. Dr. Grady examined the work and explained errors and made suggestions.

Fire Chief Hoskins gave a 10 minute talk on leaving buildings during a fire and other items of interest.

The entire assembly gave a renewal of the scout oath and were dismissed at 4:10, the emergency
