**Scout Leaders Training Course**

The "Elements of Scoutmastership" will be the name given to the training course in Boy Scout leadership offered by the North Shore Area council starting February 24, 25 and 26. In order to lower the traveling distance to these courses, the plans are to hold the course in three different centers of the area. One group will meet in Winnetka on Mondays starting the 24th. The second group will meet in Highland Park on Tuesday nights, starting February 25, and the third group will meet in Libertyville on Wednesday nights, starting February 26. These groups will all run the same program, in fact for the three hike meetings to be held on Saturdays all three groups will meet together.

The course is open to all scout leaders and scout fathers, scoutmasters, assistant scoutmasters, and commissioners and Troop committeemen are particularly urged to take advantage of the course. The National council awards a certificate to each leader completing the course.

The purpose of the course is to give the students taking it a general knowledge of the aims and content of the Boy Scout program, with stress on the method which can be used to teach this program to boys. The whole course will contain many songs, stunts, poems, games, and contests that can be taken back to the leaders own troop.

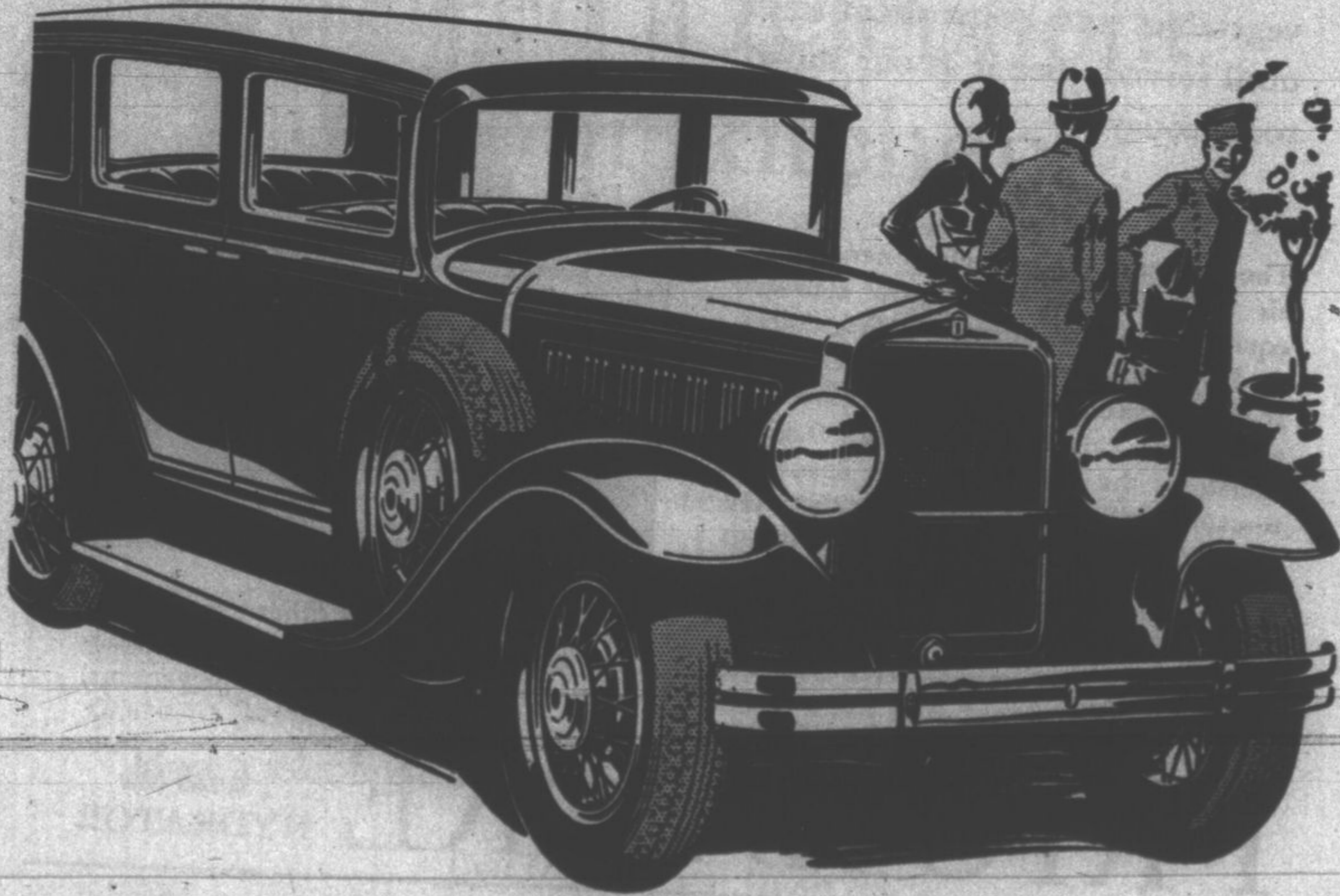
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
