Chief Hoskins Speaks at Meeting Thursday of Fire Department

The Fire Department of Deerfield held its regular meeting Thursday night in their headquarters. They had as their guest, Chief Hoskins of the Highland Park fire department. He gave a very interesting talk on the functions of the firemen, and also gave some very valuable tips on how to act in certain emergencies. He said that it was most important that all be posted on conditions in basements of stores, buildings and the different stairs and exits of buildings. He suggested that tours of inspection be made once a week to the different buildings so that the firemen could familiarize themselves with conditions there. He told of many incidents of fire hazards that he has discovered on his different inspection trips and of such fire hazards the owner of the property was in ignorance, and that the owners appreciated being told of the facts.

He stated, also, that he could sympathize with us in our problems, because he went through the same conditions in Highland Park. He went on to say that when he started, he was the only paid man and that when they had a fire it was very hard to get volunteers. After a while he got another paid man and he gave an incident of one fire where he and this other man had to fight the fire alone. Now they have 12 paid men in Highland Park and two stations.

Chief Hoskins stated that we were not getting enough publicity about our efforts, it is due to the ignorance of what we are doing.

I wish the people of Deerfield could have heard Chief Hoskins when he painted a picture of volunteer firemen going to a fire on Sunday afternoon when they were dressed in their best clothes and ruining a good suit—and called from a bed at 2 o'clock some cold morning. He stated that some of these sacrifices were brought to the public attention, the Fire Department would be much more appreciated. He added that he had attended three fires at which the Deerfield Fire Department also fought and he was very complimentary to our work.

When the weather warms up this spring, we are planning some drills in which we hope the public will be very much interested.
