A. S. Pope Commends Evans Corporation at Lions Club Meeting

Twenty-four men were present at the meeting of the Deerfield Lions' club, which was held in the Citizens' State Bank building on Wednesday, Feb. 12, at 12:30 o'clock.

T. J. Knaak, president, presiding, opened the meeting with group singing of "America," followed by the usual ritual, and roll-call. After the members had partaken of a cafeteria luncheon, the business was dispensed with to hear the speaker of the day.

Mr. McGinnis then introduced Mr. A. S. Pope, county superintendent of schools of Santa Barbara, Calif., who is in Deerfield for a very specific purpose, which he proceeded to outline in his address.

Mr. Pope pointed out what civic organizations can mean to a community, as well as to its members, individually. Many things can be accomplished collectively which individuals alone would not attempt to do. Good fellowship and sympathetic understanding derived from a club of this kind means much in the lives of men, and friendship, the greatest thing in the world, is often developed through such associations.

Mr. Pope then brought to the attention of the members the location in Deerfield of an organization of nationwide interest and importance, of

which few Deerfield people are aware. Many who do know of the Evans Collapsible Mold corporation are not cognizant of the fact that the owner, Mr. Richard Evans, has invented and patented type-setting processes which are revolutionizing the rubber stamp industry. Mr. Pope explained his interest in rubber-stamping through his association with the Printer Primer company. Mr. Pope, facing a great need of a method of producing type in a speedier, less expensive, and more perfect way, heard of the Evans corporation, and upon coming to Deerfield, found, to his amazement and delight, the identical plan which he had in mind, already perfected. While Mr. Evans has the finished product and the vision and ability to go ahead with its production, he is greatly handicapped on account of lack of capital. In concluding, Mr. Pope stressed the opportunity which is presented in Mr. Evans' project as one of the first civic duties facing the club, and said, "You, in Deerfield, have the world by the tail on a downhill pull, if you will only take advantage of it."

The inventor, Mr. Richard Evans, was then introduced, and in his delightful and inimitable manner, explained the events which led up to his invention, as well as the actual processes involved. He stated that he has the foundation, the perfected product, which, while it is now small, will unquestionably develop nationwide interest and support, but it is his earnest desire to confine the enterprise to this locality.

At the invitation of Mr. Evans the members visited his plant, which is located on Osterman avenue, Deerfield, and there Mr. Evans demonstrated his method of making in a few minutes a rubber stamp which in the ordinary processes now in general use would take several hours time. He conducted his guests on a tour of his plant, inspecting and explaining the various features of the manufacture of rubber type, and told them that he not only has his inventions patented in the United States, but in Canada as well.

Mr. Evans extends an invitation to the townspeople to visit his plant. The Deerfield Lions' club meets regularly on Wednesday noon.

The Independent Social club was delightfully entertained at the home of Mrs. Mary Cooksy on Tuesday afternoon. Five hundred was enjoyed and prizes were awarded to Mrs. Earl Frost, Mrs. Fredericks, and Mrs. Long. Mrs. L. A. Campbell was given guest prize.
