

H. P. WOMEN VOTERS STUDY LEGISLATION

League Has Instituted Series of Work Lessons for Board; Prove Valuable

The Highland Park League of Women Voters has instituted a series of "work lessons" for its board which are proving very valuable. State and federal legislative measures advocated by the league are discussed and studied much more intensively than is possible at a general meeting.

In the federal department three major congressional measures are endorsed this year by the League of Women Voters. Under the department of efficiency in government the abolition of the "lame duck" session, S. J. R. 3, already passed by the senate, is urged. Will Rogers has defined a "lame duck" as a "congressman who is still alive but whom the government paymaster has notified that he will become totally disabled by March 4."

More than 100 attempts have been made since 1798 to change the date of the inauguration and the sessions of congress. The present resolution would provide for the convening of (Continued on page 32)

Famous Lawyer to Talk to Congregation Israel, Glencoe, Sunday, Feb. 23

Aaron Sapiro, internationally-known lawyer and specialist in Co-operative Marketing, will address the members of the North Shore Congregation Israel, Lincoln and Vernon avenues, Glencoe, at the regular service next Sunday morning, February 23, at 11 o'clock.

Mr. Sapiro, who is regarded as perhaps the foremost authority on co-operative marketing in the United States today, was responsible with associates for the Standard Co-operative Marketing Act which has been adopted in whole, or in part in 41 States of the Union. He was very active in the organization of the Canadian wheat pools, the Burley Tobacco association and similar bodies. Mr. Sapiro's theme is to be: "The Jewish Contribution to American Agriculture."

It will be remembered that it was Aaron Sapiro who brought Henry Ford to trial in Detroit some two years ago which trial, won by Mr. Sapiro, resulted in one of the greatest services ever rendered the cause of the Jewish people as the cause of justice—the retraction by Ford of his world-broadcasted attacks upon the Jewish people.

RAVINIA WOMAN'S CLUB HEARS TALK

Interesting Session Held at Which Dr. Cramp's Lecture Is Feature

At the last meeting of the Ravinia Woman's club held at the Village House Wednesday, Feb. 12, Mrs. Hennessy, representative of the Traveler's Aid society, gave a ten minute talk on the work they do. The Traveler's Aid society has workers at all the large terminal stations to aid the confused traveler and children who are traveling alone.

She spoke of the need for three workers to alternate in eight hour shifts at the bus depot to meet the busses which arrive at all hours of the day and night. At present there are no workers at this point and when one is needed, the bus company has to call one of the railroad stations and a worker must be taken from some point where she is badly needed and sent to the bus depot. The coming World's Fair of 1933 will make it necessary for the society to add more workers to its present staff to take care of the influx of strangers at that time. This work is supported by contributions, and subscriptions from clubs and individuals are greatly needed and appreciated.
