Monday was the last day for filing of candidates petitions for places on the primary election ballot, and the complete list of aspirants in Lake county is reported as follows:

For sheriff: H. A. Doolittle, Lester Tiffany, Ed Ahlstrom, Elmer Green, and Ed Brown, all republicans, and Herbert Yager, democrat.

For county judge: Perry L. Persons and Charles Jack, republican, and Joseph Jadrich, democrat.

For county clerk: Lew A. Hendee, republican; Joseph Daley, democrat.

For probate judge: Martin C. Decker, republican, unopposed.

For probate clerk: John Bullock, republican; Thomas Sexton, democrat.

For county treasurer: J. B. Morse, republican; Peter Duffy, democrat.

For county superintendent of schools: T. Arthur Simpson, republican, W. C. Petty, republican, and Mrs. Frances Moody, democrat.

The complete list of filings from Springfield had not been received yesterday. Thus far the following republicans are entered: Lake county, Lee McDonough, Richard J. Lyons, Grace Bairstow, and Fred Galiger; McHenry county, Attorney William A. Carrol and Charles Palmer; Boone county, John Fair and N. L. "India Lily" Attracts Much Attention Here

The "India Lily" a black Calla lily from Cochin, China, is in full bloom at the W. G. Searles home at 1504 Dean avenue, and is attracting wide spread attention in this community. It is a very rare species in this country. The bulb is planted out of doors in the spring and in the fall when the leaves dry returned to the cellar. At the end of four years the plant is put in a jar and without soil or moisture the bulb sends up a spotted marble-like stem bearing a brown and black flower like the Calla lily. The stalk is from 30 to 50 inches tall. The plant has only recently been introduced in this country.

Road Bond Issue in County May Be Voted on in Spring Election

With the annual returns from the 1929 gas tax law assured for some years to come, County Highway Superintendent R. M. Lobdell reports that the \$1,250,000 road bond issue program which he proposed to the board of supervisors in September, will be put to a vote when the board meets again in March.

If the board approves of the plan by resolution, a popular ballot on the bond issue may be ordered in time for the elections in April. The machinery of calling the bond issue to a vote requires that the supervisors, after approving of the program, submit their resolution to the state department of highways for an o. k. When this is accomplished, the board can order a popular vote on the question.

It is planned to have the approval of the state highway department before the March session of the board is adjourned so that the election can be ordered in the same session.

With an amount between \$110,000 and \$120,000 accumulating every year in the coffers of the state treasurer, a bond issue of the sum named can be floated and retired within 10 years with assurance.
