

HIGH SCHOOL P. T. A. GETS NOTED SPEAKER

Daniel C. Chase, Sec'y. Sportsman's Brotherhood, Coming Here March 20

Mr. Daniel C. Chase, executive secretary of the Sportsmanship Brotherhood, is making the trip from New York especially to address the Parent-Teacher association of the Deerfield-Shields high school on March 20. Because of the unusual opportunity of having such an important man in the world of athletics as speaker, the meeting is postponed from the usual time on the first Thursday of the month, to Thursday, March 20.

This really should be an evening meeting when the men of the community could hear what this outstanding sportsman has to say about athletics, but since the April meeting is the big evening meeting of the year, held jointly with all the other P. T. A.'s of the district, it seemed unwise to try to hold an evening meeting in March. However, there are many men, especially fathers of boys in high school who could well afford to take an afternoon off and come to hear the latest news of the state of affairs in American athletics, with special reference to high school athletics.

Highly Recommended

Mr. Chase was recommended by Dr. Howard Savage, head of the Research committee of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching which has recently published the famous report on American athletics. That report, by the way, is in the Highland Park Public Library, and another one at the high school, and it is suggested that parents and teachers will find it well worth looking through.

Mr. Chase was former chief of the Division of Health and Physical Education of the University of the State of New York. He is a trained public speaker much in demand at schools and colleges, especially now when the whole question of athletics and physical training is up for re-valuation and re-organization.

CONTINUE HEARING ON SHERIDAN ROAD

Proposed Extension South Not Encountering Much Opposition, Report

At the regular meeting of the city council and board of local improvements Monday evening, the public hearing on the proposed Sheridan road extension and improvement was the chief feature of interest and attracted a large number of persons interested. After some discussion, it was voted to continue the hearing for one week.

The plan to extend Sheridan road south across Central avenue and thru property to be acquired for the purpose, joining Laurel at the south end of the extension and continuing along Laurel, with a wide turn into St. John avenue was reported generally favored by the property owners affected.

Several Objectors

However, there were several objections offered and requests for further time for consideration of the matter. T. H. Decker wanted his entire lot taken into the street improvement; the Y.W.C.A. while not desiring to oppose any necessary improvement, felt that it might react unfavorably to their property; the library board wanted a continuance and fears that dangers to children crossing streets might be increased by the plan, if carried into effect. Several asked questions, and Mayor Lewis explained practically all of the objections voiced had been carefully considered by the board before the plan was finally ready for hearing and that effort had been made to overcome them in as far as possible. He felt that it would be a great benefit and pointed out that few objections had been offered and that it was impossible to please everybody in making any improvement.
