

### FOUR CHILDREN TO HAVE CHIEF ROLES

In "Scotch Twins" to Be Presented Saturday at Elm Place Auditorium

Four children chosen from the dramatic department of the Evanston schools are to play the leading parts in the performance of "The Scotch Twins," to be presented at the Elm Place school auditorium Saturday, March 1.

Jack Lord and Mary Gunn, 12-year old pupils in Nichols Intermediate school, play the parts of Jock and Jean Cambell, the 12-year-old twins. Robert Cummings is Sandy Crumpet, their bosom friend and Oliver Babcock is Allen McRae, the boy from London.

#### Won in Competition

These children won the coveted parts in tryouts in which many children competed. The pupils standing at the head of 10 advanced dramatic classes were allowed to try for the parts. By a process of sifting, eight children were chosen for a double cast, each cast to play to two of the Evanston performances. The Highland Park cast is made up of two children from each group.

#### Adult Members

The adult members of the cast come from Northwestern university School of Speech. Mason Hicks, who is a great favorite of the children since he played Friar Tuck in "Robin Hood" is this time playing the deep-dyed villain of the story. He is a poaching gamekeeper who is not quite clever enough to outwit the children. Having formed a clan for the express purpose of "Badgening the life out of him." They quickly get him ousted from his position. Barney, his easy going partner in crime, is played by Miver Gobuon, well known for his acting all along the north shore. Rex Wilkes, who has done distinguished work in the University theater, is Robin Campbell, the kindly folks of the twins. Ellen Grawlich is Mrs. Geunpet, Dorothy Nice is Her Ladyship, and a group of students from the Children's theater class of the university are the tenants on the Glencairn estate.

Miss Eleanor Perkins, author of the play, will attend the Highland Park performance instead of the Evanston one, as she will be in California when the latter is given. This is the third and last in the series of plays for children sponsored by the Woman's club. ### H. P. Policeman Escapes Serious Injury in N. S. Line Wreck at Kenosha

Policeman Wilson Richardson of the Highland Park police night force, was a passenger on the ill-fated North Shore Line limited which was wrecked Sunday night at a crossing north of Kenosha, when a speeding automobile tried to beat it to the intersection, and piled the fast train into a ditch, smashing a freight train on a parallel rack also from the rails. Richardson, who was in one of the rear coaches of the train, was not seriously injured, and aided in the rescue of other passengers. He reports many pitiable scenes as dead and injured were taken from the wreckage.

William B. Hall, motorman of the passenger train, who was severely injured, was formerly a resident of Highland Park and Lake Forest, both, it is reported, but more recently had been living in Chicago. Several other Lake county people were in the wreck, most of them from Waukegan or Libertyville, and none of them received dangerous injuries, it is reported.

The Highland Park League of Women Voters met last Wednesday at the Presbyterian church. The meeting was well attended, and the luncheon was delicious as usual.

Mrs. Hopkins, president, read a letter from Miss Sherwin, president of the National League, urging a study of federal measures endorsed by the League. Mrs. Hopkins also spoke of the 10th anniversary of the League which is to be celebrated in March, by a nation-wide birthday party.

#### Interesting Talk

Mrs. Paul Douglas, state chairman of Women in Industry, was the speaker of the day, and was introduced by the local chairman, Miss Ellen Guiney. Mrs. Douglas, who has taken a degree in political science, and who has taught at Smith college and Mt. Holyoke, discussed "industrial" conditions in Illinois. She presented a very graphic picture of the present unemployment situation, which she says is most serious. Throngs of men—many respectable workmen—are seeking shelter at improvised lodging houses, where for 10 cents they may secure coffee and corn bread, and a place to sleep on a crowded floor. The Y. W.
