## Rasmussen Gets Report Regarding Work Done by Legion Service Officer

Monty Rasmussen of Lake Forest, Lake county child welfare officer of the eighth district, American Legion, has received the following report from Lester R. Benston, department servmake the changes in its effort to ice officer, regarding the work of his office in aid to veterans:

Since the first of the fiscal year of the American Legion, which starts October 10, 1929, the service department, located at 160 North LaSalle street, Chicago, has secured a total of \$157,331.94 for veterans and their dependents.

For the veteran, this represents awards of compensation; increase in compensation; benefits under the Ofcers' Retirement Act; State Bonus claims; and pensions and apportionments of compensation in the amount of \$52,373.88.

For the families of deceased veterans, this represents War Risk Insurance awards; Adjusted Compensation awards; accrued compensation due the estates of soldiers, and reimbursements on funeral expenses. Awards to widows and dependent parents was in the amount of \$104,-958.06.

The figures also show that this total represents 211 such claims actually handled through the service department.

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The attention of ex-service men has again been invited to the fact that claims for disability compensation must be filed before April 6, 1930, and that all evidence in support of such claims must be submitted before the same date.
