

Burglars Break Into North Chicago Home; Chloroform Aged Man

Gaining entrance by "jimmying" a dining room window, two masked robbers completely ransacked the home of Attorney Max Przyborski, 1415 Lincoln street, North Chicago, and made their escape with \$30 in cash after slugging and chloroforming Martin Przyborski, 71-year-old father of the attorney one night last week.

The father was the only person in the home at the time and police are working on the theory that two local robbers, who knew that the home

was almost unprotected, were the assailants.

Tables were overturned, clocks thrown to the floor, dresser drawers were pulled out and every effort spent by the robbers in their search for loot.

Two trunks, one of them sent to the Przyborski home two days ago, and a suitcase, were taken from the home but later were found at the rear of the home where the robbers were believed to have been frightened away.

Attorney Przyborski has been at Miami Beach, Fla., with his wife for the past several weeks. He is not expected until the latter part of the month. "Bud" Przyborski, the son,

is attending school at Lake Forest university.

Attorney Przyborski is the assistant attorney general for this district, serving under Attorney General Carlstrom in Lake county, and has also held the rank of city attorney in North Chicago for the past several years. He is chairman of the Lake County Republican Central committee.

New Buildings Planned for Veterans Hospital to Cost Half-Million

Plans of the government to build a series of new buildings at the Great Lakes Naval station at a total cost of \$500,000 was announced late last week. Plans are to be submitted to contractors and bids on the project will be received in the near future, it is stated.

The building program will include the erection of an infirmary, warehouse, laundry building, garage and quarters for officers. The buildings will be of brick and stone following the architecture of the other structures at the station.

The series of new buildings are to be erected in conformance with the general program of enlargement of the station and the project follows an extensive building program completed two years ago.

Appropriations have been provided for the buildings it is stated and the final plans for the structures are now being drafted.

Indications are that the construction work will be started as early this year as possible and that it will continue throughout the summer.
