

### COUNTY COUNCIL OF LEGION HAS MEETING

#### Interesting Session Held With N. Chicago Post as Host; Proceedings

The Lake County Council of the American Legion met Friday night at North Chicago with the Sharvin post as host.

County Commander Charles Kap-schull opened the meeting. After a few introductory remarks the Sharvin Drum and Bugle Corps gave a splendid exhibition of their skill on those instruments.

zation, taking the floor first. He gave a rather lengthy report, telling of the many improvements that Dr. St. Antoine had accomplished at the Veterans' hospital, and what the doctor had planned for the future. He stressed the statement that Dr. St. Antoine needed the support of the Legion to obtain the necessary improvements. One of the things that the doctor had achieved was that of "feeding the men on real china and with knives and forks—instead of like animals—out of tin dishes."

The Legion Boy Scout committee reported the organization of a troop in Grays Lake. Co-operation with the scouts throughout the county is now a part of the Legion program, it was stated.

An airplane will be waiting at Gt. Lakes on Feb. 28 to leave with the final report on membership. Similar planes will leave from every county in the state to see which county wins first place in the race on that date. Lake county is now in second place.

#### Tells of Red Activities

A colored post in Waukegan that will include all the colored men in the county seems to be assured. Several of the colored leaders expressed themselves as heartily in favor of the plan and it is expected that a charter will soon be issued to them, was the report of Bruce Henderson. He also suggested that this post be organized into a drill team for parade purposes, the members to be equipped with a uniform of some striking design. This suggestion received the approbation of the assembly.

The regular routine of business was pleasingly interrupted by the "Sharvin Post Glee Club," consisting of three artists in costume. The novelty of the event and the spirit with which the numbers were given received an ovation from the crowd. Art Nelson and Joe Rivelli certainly can sing and are good comedians. Jerry Martin, concertina artist, displayed remarkable ability as a solo-

ist and proved his worth as an accompanist.

One thousand dollars given to the Legion under the Bogardus act by the county board of supervisors was nearly spent it was reported and the probability of double that amount being necessary for next year was discussed. The board of supervisors has assured the Legion of their co-operation. Calls for relief were frequent this winter and taken care of, said the report.

Adam Janowski, of North Chicago, and a former student at Lake Forest college, gave a stirring and illuminating address on what the Communists are doing and what they hoped to accomplish in this country. He warned his listeners that they should not shrug their shoulders and say that it was "all talk" because the Reds were actively at work winning adherents. He stated that the Reds were working through the children on the theory that "get hold of the child and you have your army." He said they based their appeals on three points: atheism, sex, and free speech. Atheism led to disbelief in all standards of present day living, sex literature destroyed morals, and free speech lead to upheaval of all existing governments.

This was one of the best meetings the county has had since its organization, as over two hundred were on hand. The spirit of the county Legionnaires can best be judged when it is stated that at the Lake Forest meeting last month, with the temperature below zero, nearly three hundred members turned out.

The next meeting will be held in Highwood, March 21.

### February Meeting of N. S. Real Estate Board Talks Are Features

The February dinner meeting of the North Shore Real Estate Board, held at the Green Tea Pot Highland Park was an exceptionally interesting meeting because of the two speakers present. Mr. J. J. Moran gave a talk on the subject of 'Metroland Tours' in and around metropolitan Chicago.

The Outing and Recreation Bureau, has charge of these tours, and is located at 72 W. Adams street, Chicago. Through this bureau trips can be arranged to visit unusual places of Chicago's business and social life.

Mr. Ralph V. Field, executive secretary, of the Illinois Association of Real Estate boards, urged the North Shore Real Estate Board members to organize a Property Owners division of the board, with a view of securing much needed legislation on taxes. ### T. B. Association Wants Addition to Hospital

A request is to be made of the county board of supervisors for an addition to the tuberculosis ward at the county hospital, it was learned last week from members of a joint Lake County Tuberculosis association and county hospital committee.

The joint committee, composed of Dr. Frederick A. Besley, William T. Hardie, of Waukegan, and Mrs. Jeanette Aiken of Winthrop Harbor, and Supervisors David Van Patten, Charles Wright and Henry C. W. Meyer, will outline the problem of financing such a step, it was learned.

The hospital has been short of bed space for tuberculars for several years but during the same time it has been cramped so financially that it has been impossible to consider further construction.

The matter was discussed at the last session of the board and as a result the joint committee was named.
