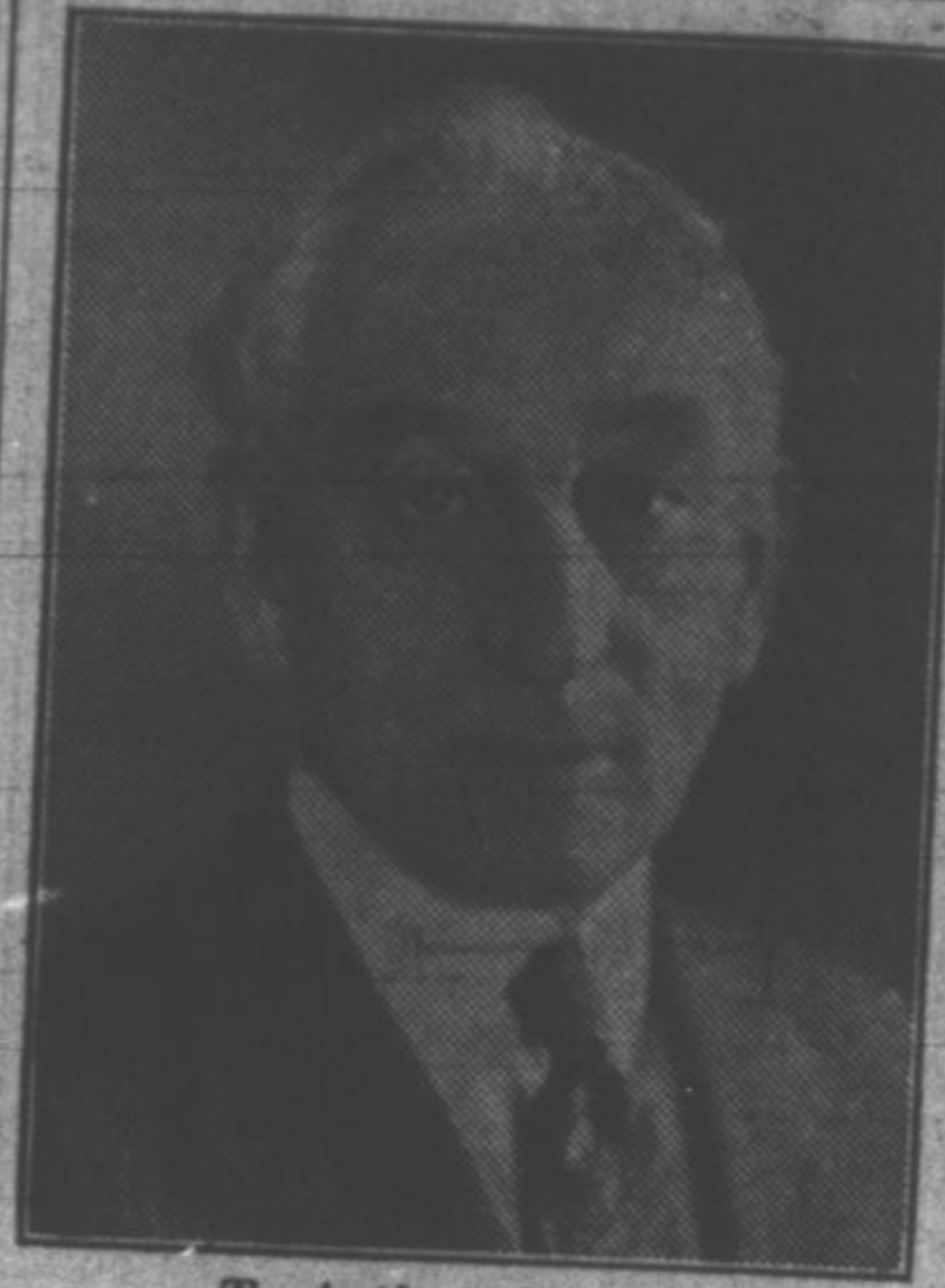

### Out For Re-Election

T. A. Simpson, county superintendent of schools, who bears the distinction of having developed the county rural and village school system from last place in the state in 1906 to first by 1928, according to Francis G. Blair, state superintendent of public instruction, today launched his campaign for re-election along the North Shore.

Mr. Simpson explained that he would give a minimum of time to the campaign due to pressing school problems and general routine and would speak to the voters through newspaper advertising which would be the only method of following such a program.

He established education on a sound basis by first improving the teaching and the methods of instruction and then encouraging the physical improvement of buildings and grounds.

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### Martin Victor Writes Another Letter from Alaska; Tells of Trip

The following letter from Martin Victor, of Victor Bros., furriers, explains itself. It is written from Nenana, Alaska, February 1, 1930, to the Highland Park Press:

Well, this is a real Indian town, all at once you hear a native shouting, his whip cracking at his dogs, tearing through the town, all dressed up in his parka, mukloks, (boots). There is quite a deal of activity here as this is one of the fur centers where the Indians come to trade their furs for provisions.

I have now procured my parka, made from Caribou, with small designs of white sheep along bottom edge, and wolverine skin along all edges, cuffs and around the face. The Indians are very superstitious and claim that the frost from your breath does not cling to wolverine. They also attach a few strings of it on the arms and on the back of the parka to drive the evil spirits away. My mukloks (boots) are also made from Caribou. They are mainly made from the legs of that animal as the hair is shorter and more durable. They reach the knees.

My plans were to meet an Indian from the Seward Peninsula with 16 dogs, but has not showed up, and has not been heard from. Not relying on him, I have purchased a crack team, considered the fastest in this vicinity. The team consists of six dogs. The leader is four years old, very dependable, and five young dogs ranging from 1 1/2 to 2 years old. The sleigh is native made, nine feet long.

Am spending the present days mushing them ten to fifteen miles per day, becoming accustomed to them as they are only used to an Indian and it is very hard to get them to mind. Once you start the dogs off, they don't stop unless you can press the brake hard enough, if you happen to slip and fall, they keep on running for miles until something stops them.

By Thursday I expect to be all prepared to start alone on a 1500 mile trip westward through Lake Minehumina, which is north of the Alaska Range, to Ophir, Iditarod, to Ruby following the Yukon river to Tanana, and to Fairbanks. When I've reached Fairbanks I hope to be there in time to enter the dog derby, as my team is fast enough to enter. If weather permits, will leave for Circle, to Eagle, to Dawson, Y. Territory. Will then come to Skagway by boat as spring will be well on the way.

There are a few radio fans here, but reception is very poor coming from the states. Japan comes in very good as it is only 1200 miles from here. England and most of Europe is very good for those who have short wave sets, as the distance is very small, coming over the North Pole.

It is time that I go and feed my dogs. Regards to all.
