been well known and highly esteemed residents of Highland Park for about 15 years, had been in Florida less than three weeks prior to Mr. Winters' death, which was due to heart trouble. He had been in poor health about two and one-half years, it was reported by relatives. Mrs. Winters returned with the body of her husband on Wednesday.

Besides the widow Mr. Winters is survived by four children, all of whom are here: John A. Winters of New York City, Mrs. Flavel Robertson of Kansas City, Mo., Mrs. Sterling Warren of New Britain, Conn., and Miss Theodora Winters of this city. A brother, Harry L. Winters of New York, also is living.

Mr. Winters was a partner in the firm of Hulburd, Warren and Chandler, grain brokers of Chicago, and had been a member of the Board of Trade for 31 years. He was a member of the Union League club, Exmoor club and the Highland Park club. The family came to Highland Park in 1915, and the residence is at 359 Laurel avenue.

In Highland Park Mr. Winters had many warm friends who appreciate his many fine qualities and valued his friendship and among them there is sincere sorrow at his death. They and the community in general extend sympathy.

### L. B. Orphanage, Arden Shore Gets Bequests in Will of C. M. P. Wright

Arden shore camp and the Lake Bluff Orphanage are among the beneficiaries of the will of the late Charles M. P. Wright, who died at 4:30 Saturday morning, Feb. 23, at his home on Cary avenue, Highland Park, following about a week's illness of pneumonia. The funeral was held Monday at the residence and burial was in Rosehill cemetery.

Mr. Wright was 67 years of age and was vice president of the Thomas Cusack & Sons until that company was merged with the General Outdoor Advertising Co. He had resided in Highland Park about 15 years. His wife died some years ago and there are no children. Near relatives are four brother and one sister, Penniston Wright of Madison, Wis.; E. W. Wright of Boston, Thomas Wright, in California; Harold Wright of Boston and Miss Annie Wright of Allston, Mass., near Boston. Mrs. Vina H. Haggerty, widow of Chris Haggerty, former Chicago manager of the Associated Press, is a sister of Mr. Wright's deceased wife.

According to reports from Chicago, Mr. Wright's will, which was found by his attorney in a safety deposit box, leaves \$130,000 to various charitable institutions, among them Arden Shore camp, which is given \$10,000, and Lake Bluff Orphanage, which is to get \$5,000. The remainder of the estate which is estimated at nearly one million dollars, goes to relatives. The largest single bequest is \$60,000 to Mrs. Haggerty; the sister, Miss Annie Wright gets \$50,000 and the four brothers, each \$10,000, according to the terms of the will as reported. Other bequests are made to distant relatives and friends.
