Board Amends and Advances Ordinance to Council; Filed; Other Matters

Extension of Sheridan road south to Laurel and the widening and other improvements connected therewith were recommended to the city council by the board of local improvements, following an adjourned public hearing on the matter Monday evening, and the board submitted an ordinance which incorporated a minor amendment. This ordinance was placed on file by the council for public inspection.

The amendment provided by the board limits the improvement of Central avenue east of the intersection to extend only to the east line of the west 25 feet of Lot 6, which is about to the Witten building, it is explained.
