

DR. METCALF TALKS AT ROTARY MEETING

Gives Interesting Address Monday at Session; F. W. Cushing Tells of Trip

The principal address at the regular weekly luncheon and session of the Highland Park Rotary club, Monday noon, at the Moraine hotel, was Dr. Walter B. Metcalf of Deerfield on the subject, "Our Great Challenge." His talk in full is given below.

Manager F. W. Cushing of the Moraine gave an interesting account of his recent trip to Florida and points in the Caribbean Islands and South America, during which he visited Trinidad, Caracass, Panama, Colon, San Diego, Cuba, Havana, Cuba; Jamaica, Nassau, Bahama Islands, etc. He reported a fine trip and many interesting experiences. Dr. Metcalf's Address

The challenge to the medical profession has always been to save life and relieve human suffering; today our greatest challenge is to prevent the loss of lives and human suffering—safety first.

For many years previous to but especially since the termination of the World war, we have heard and read much about the efforts being made to abolish war, with its consequent evils, once and forever. It is not my intention to give here an analytical discussion of wars, their causes and results. I leave that to historical authorities.
