

Antioch Woman Gets State Appointment at Normal University

Mrs. Ruby Richey, home economics instructor of the Antioch township high school, has been appointed manager of the cafeteria of the Illinois State Normal university at Normal, Ill., for the coming summer. Dean H. H. Schroeder, who is acting president of this university since the death of Dr. Felmley, notified Mrs. Richey of this appointment.

Mrs. Richey has reasons to accept this position with much pleasure

since this university is her alma mater. She took a bachelor of education degree from this institution in 1926. Since that time, she has directed the cafeteria as well as taught home economics in the Antioch high school.

Mrs. Richey will report for duty on June 14, but she states that she is planning to spend a week-end on the university campus soon to collect data which will aid her in outlining her work for the summer.

She had planned to return to New York City again this summer and continue her course at the Columbia university, but owing to this unusual ap-

pointment, she feels that her experience from this position will be more valuable than a summer at Columbia university.

Witnesses Say Auto Driven on Crossing Caused Kenosha Wreck

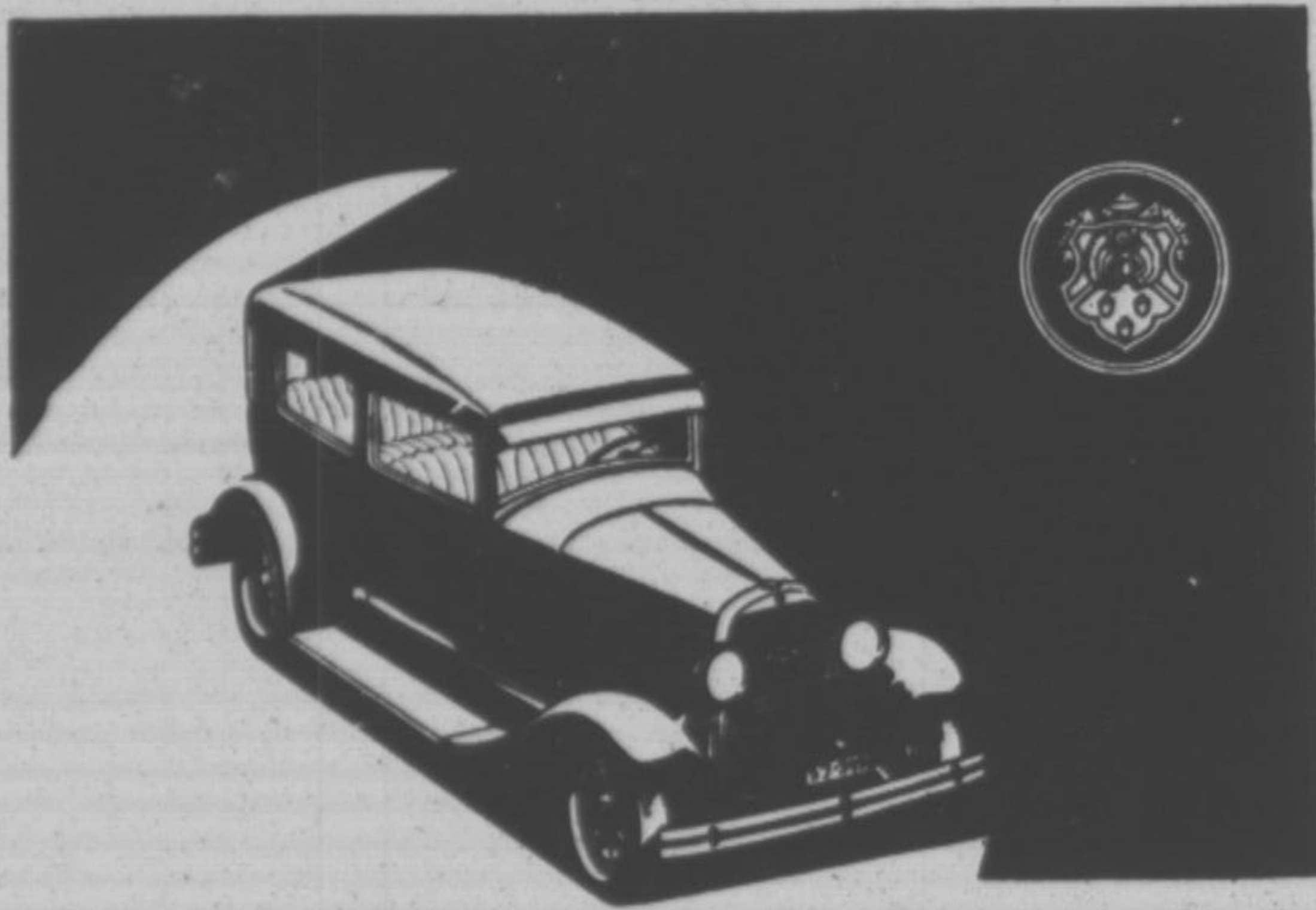
The only two persons who actually saw the North Shore line wreck at Kenosha in which 11 were killed and over 100 injured, told their stories last week to District Attorney Morris Barnett and Coroner A. B. Schmitz. Irene Sand, 37, and Algot Lindquist, 41, were returning from a visit in Waukegan and drew up at the crossing to allow the two trains to pass, just as the car driven by Norman Shinnors swung past them and was hurled into oblivion by the five-car Skokie Valley limited.

Both of the eye-witnesses testified that they plainly saw both the north bound freight train and the Chicago limited, and had been waiting at the

crossing for more than half a minute when the automobile which was later identified as that of Shinnors passed their car. The crossing bell was ringing and the red light swinging, they declared.

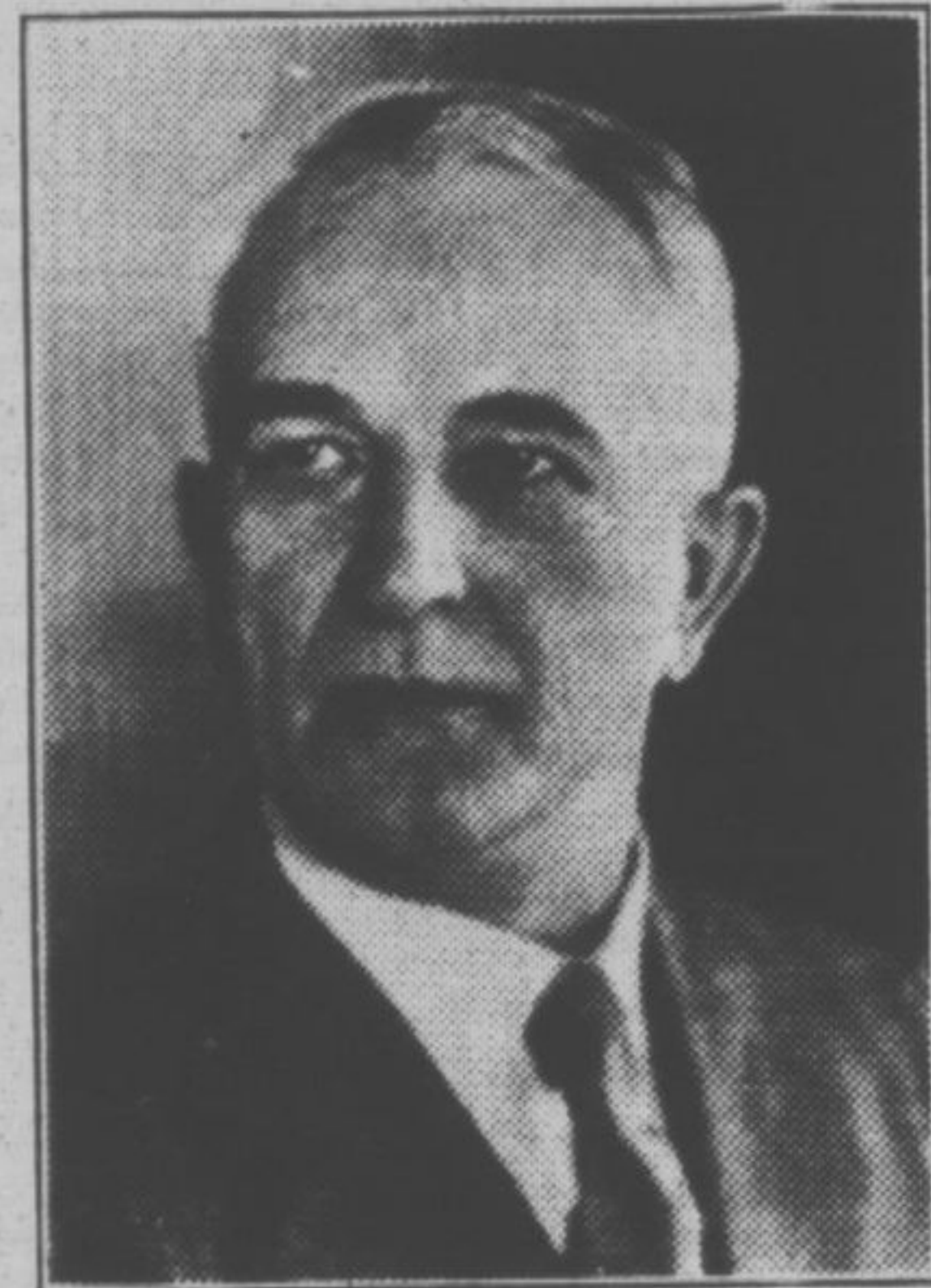
