JUDGE C. C. EDWARDS RESIGNS FROM BENCH

Sends Resignation to Governor, Monday; To Resume Pri- vate Practice

Judge Claire C. Edwards, for more than 15 years on the circuit bench, startled the Lake county bar Mon- day with an announcement of his res- ignment from the office. He sent his resignation to Governor Emmerson requesting that it be immediately ac- cepted.

In an exhaustive statement given to the press Judge Edwards offers a single reason for his resignation; the financial stringency which the judge's salary has laid upon him and his family.

He will take up the practice of law immediately upon the acceptance of his resignation, and, it is understood, he will take offices with Attorney Ralph Dady, counsel for the First National bank of Waukegan of which the judge is a director.

The Lake County Bar association was officially apprised of the judge's intention at luncheon Monday, when they met after the reading of the docket for the March term of court.

Means Special Election

The present term of office of Judge Edwards, which expires in June, 1933, will be filled by a special elec- tion to be called by the governor, and until then, it is expected that Judge

Shurtleff or Judge Fisher will preside in Waukegan for the March term.

An official Republican candidate for the 17th judicial district will be chosen at a meeting of the district judicial committee, which will prob- ably be held at Rockford soon after the special election is called. Twenty- two delegates from the Lake county bar selected by the County Republi- can Central committee will meet with delegates from McHenry, Winnebago, and Boone counties, and the choice of the combined delegations for the judgeship will be named.

Since the retiring judge is a resi- dent of Lake county it is expected that the judicial committee will re- fer to this county and agree to sup- port a local man.
