

HIGH SCHOOL P. T. A. LECTURE MARCH 20

Talk on Sportsmanship by Daniel Chase, Noted Authority of Research Group

"Sportsmanship, a Character Essential" is the title of the talk which Daniel Chase, executive secretary of the Sportsmanship Brotherhood will give March 20 at the Deerfield-Shields high school P. T. A. meeting. Mr. Chase, himself an athlete of distinction in his college days, has long been associated with the various phases of physical training and athletics. In college he not only was a member of the Varsity football and baseball teams, but he also went out in the class teams in track, basketball, tennis and hockey.

Question of Athletics

Following this major interest, he has been director of athletics at two colleges, was inspector of Physical Training for the New York State Military Training Commission, and was supervisor of Physical Education and chief of Bureau of Physical Education of New York State for seven years. In addition, Mr. Chase has given much attention to directing and organizing Boys and Girls camps. He organized the New York State Public high school athletic association, and after serving as president for six years, is now honorary president.

Research Work

But the phase of his work which interests the public the most today, is that which he did as president of the Athletic Research Society of America. Nowadays, one can hardly pick up a paper or magazine without finding some reference to the lively discussion going on in the world of physical training and athletics about the findings of the Research committee on American Athletics made by the Carnegie Foundation for the advancement of teaching. Although not a member of the research staff, Mr. Chase was in close touch with the work, and gave valuable co-operation.

Hopes to Arouse Interest

In offering this program on Sportsmanship, the program committee hopes to stimulate interest in our local facilities for physical training, an appreciation of the work being done by the men and women of the high school physical training department, and better understanding and co-operation with them on the part of the parents.

The meeting will be held in the auditorium at 3 p. m.

Lake Forest Plans to Erect Own High School

Initial steps in the direction of detaching that part of the Deerfield-Shields Township high school district comprised by the portion of the city of Lake Forest included in the district is seen in the preparation of petitions to be circulated in the city of Lake Forest for signature of those favoring this step. These petitions which are addressed to the county superintendent of schools, will be in circulation in a few days. The move is based on an amendment of the statute a couple of years ago by the state legislature to provide a method for thus separating such territory from a township high school district. Lake Forest plans to erect its own high school if this plan goes through.
