County Board Approves Road Improvement Plan; Bond Issue Vote April 29

With but two dissenting votes the

One resolution provided for the conof refunds due the county from the state. Of this money \$600,000 is expected within a short time and \$400,-000 at a much longer interval.

The second resolution provides for the construction of 37 miles of paving in the first and secondary road system to be financed out of a \$1,250,from the gasoline tax. The bond issue vote will be taken April 29.

Have \$150,000 Income

The income from the gasoline tax will be approximately \$150,000 annually. This is a minimum figure, according to members of the county board.

They base their predictions on the first return from the state. This covered a five month period, August, September, October, November and December, and returned \$71,591.18 to the county for road uses. The other seven months, it was pointed out, would bring the annual return to or above \$150,000.

In addition to this sum the county has \$52,000 to its credit from the defunct gasoline tax that became effective during the Gov. Len Small administration.
