## SUBURBAN BUILDING GAIN OVER JANUARY

**February Total, However, Shows 60 Per Cent Loss from February, 1929**

Chicago suburbs showed a gain in February building of 81 per cent over the total permits issued in January of this year, according to the building survey department of S. W. Straus & Co. The February total of \$2,103,118, however, is a loss of 60 per cent compared with the same month last year.

Evanston took honors this month with the largest total volume, \$930,500, which was a gain of 45 per cent over the same month last year and 956 per cent over the preceding month this year. Cicero had the second largest volume this month—a gain of 118 per cent over last year, and Gary was third, making a gain of 737 per cent over February 1929.

Other increases in the February-February comparison were as follows: Elmwood Park 99 per cent, Highland Park 58 per cent, Lombard 7906 per cent, Park Ridge 71 per cent, and St. Charles 16 per cent.

The gains in February compared with January of this year were: Blue Island 19 per cent; Cicero 1099 per cent; Des Plaines 337 per cent, Evanston 956 per cent; Forest Park 8 per cent, Harvey 336 per cent; Highland Park 202 per cent; Hinsdale 227 per cent; Lombard 11,982 per cent; Maywood 208 per cent; St. Charles 175 per cent; Villa Park 57 per cent; Waukegan 34 per cent; Winnetka 6 per cent; Gary 637 per cent, and Hammond 16 per cent.
