Building Report for February Shows Gain

Building improvements in Highland Park for which permits were issued from the office of Building Inspector S. D. Morris total in estimated cost \$92,500. They include three dwellings, \$79,500; three private garages, \$1,-200; six alterations, \$11,800. The total amount of fees for these permits was \$321.34. The total estimated value of improvements started in February, 1929, was \$58,600. This shows a considerable gain in last month's report over that of the same period a year ago.
