

Proclaims Week of April 27 as Health Week in This State

Gov. Louis L. Emmerson today issued a proclamation designating the week beginning Sunday, April 27 as Health Promotion Week and Thursday, May 1 as Child Health day.

"I invite the people of Illinois to observe these periods by an enthusiastic participation in a program which will be promulgated for the purpose of bringing about a general and sympathetic understanding of sci-

entific methods of preventing diseases and promoting health," his proclamation said.

"I hereby designate the state department of public health as the official agency to develop a program suitable for the occasion and I suggest that communication with that department be free and general to the end that uniform and concerted action may secure to the people of Illinois the fullest possible degree of improvement in health conditions which affect so vitally our physical and economical well being.

"Health and safety have been ascribed by the highest court in the land to take precedence over all other matters and present prosperity and happiness in the hope of the future depend upon the security and protection of physical and mental well-being in ourselves and in our children. The application of ways and means for preventing disease and promoting vigorous health is lagging far behind the possibilities which have been demonstrated as practicable by sound scientific medical practice."

BOARD TO CONSIDER GAS TAX FUND USE

Will Determine How Money Will Be Expended; Road Bond Issue Talk

While Lake county has \$123,352 from the gasoline tax to its credit in the state treasury the road and bridge committee of the county board of supervisors does not intend to outline a definite program of expenditures until the matter can be taken before the March session of the county board this week it was learned from R. M. Lobbell, county superintendent of highways.

For almost a year members of the board have considered the possibility of a bond issue to complete the secondary road system which would place every home in the county not more than a mile and a half from a concrete road. This would be paid for from the gasoline tax returns.

The amount of money necessary to complete such a program would not be less than 1,000,000 and not more than \$1,250,000, according to the road superintendent.

Some of the members of the board have taken the position that such a bond issue would carry because it would not involve the payment of additional taxes as the return from the gas tax would cover both principal and interest.

The advantages of making the expenditure through a bond issue in the space of two, or possibly three years at the most, would allow larger contracts which would result in more miles of paving than 10 or 20 small contracts that would result from the disbursing of gas tax money as it arrived, it was argued.

Two Charged with Pleas of Not Guilty in 2 Murder Charges

Deputy Sheriff William Klarkowski and John Dadian, both indicted on charges of murder, were arraigned before Circuit Judge Claire C. Edwards and entered pleas of not guilty. States Attorney S. H. Block appeared for the state. Neither was admitted to bail as the charge forbids freedom.

Klarkowski was indicted for the slaying of Douglas E. Steuber while Dadian, an Armenian, was accused of killing Ali Mamet, a Turk, with whom he had argued on religious matters.

Sebastian Gotter, who is to be represented by Behanna and Attorney Willard Longcor, pleaded not guilty to the shooting of Mr. and Mrs. August Hallman of 4th lake. He was released on bonds of \$5,000.

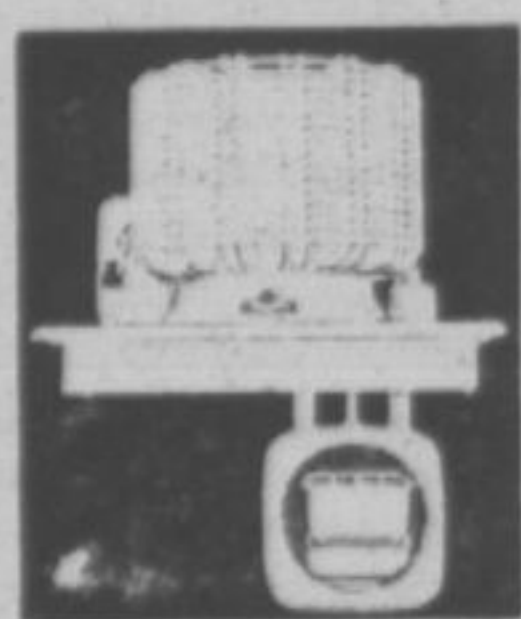

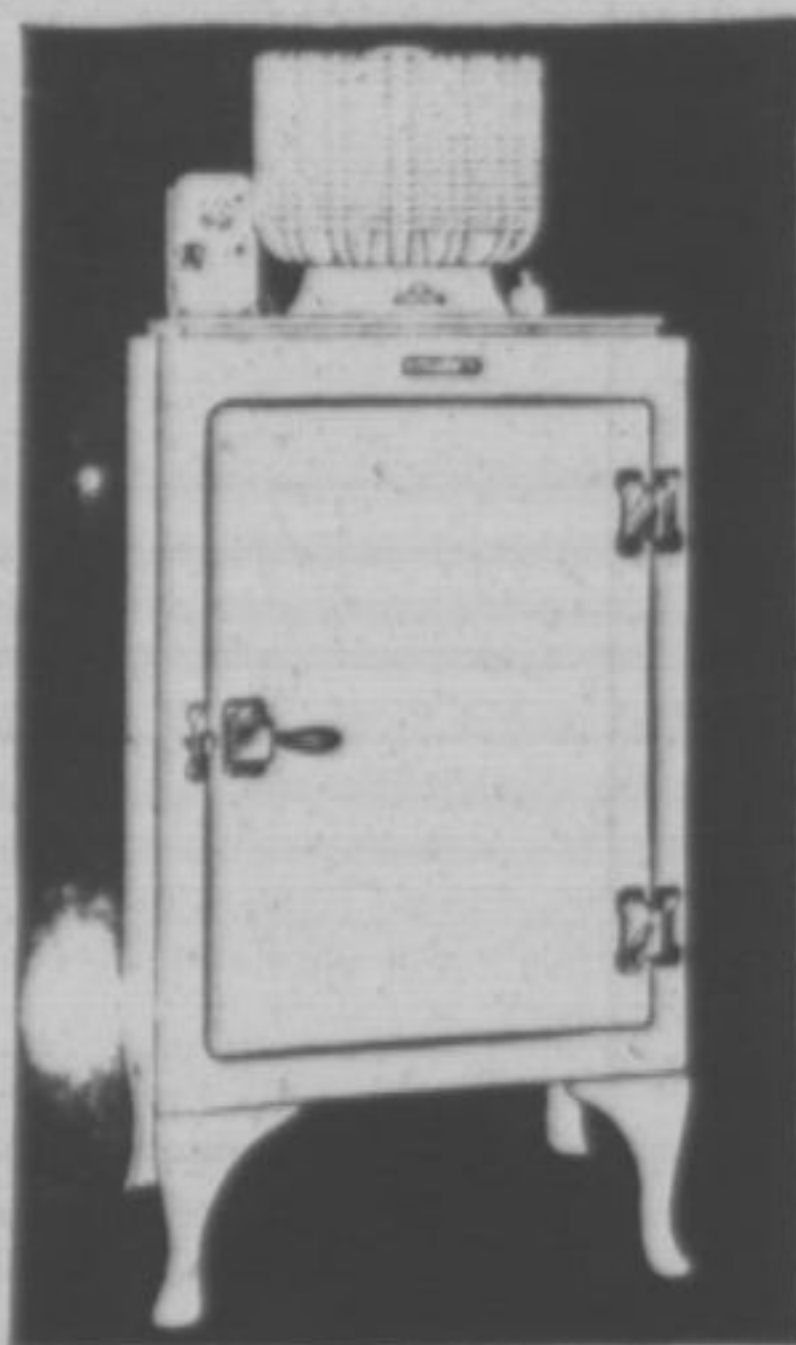
