N. S. Line Employees Accept Renewal of Existing Wage Scale

Acceptance of the wage scale fixed by the board of arbitration was voted at a meeting of employes of the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee railroad in a meeting held in Highland, last week. The scale provides for the same wages under which the employes of the railroad have worked for several years.

Employes of the railroad were somewhat disappointed in the ruling of the board of arbitration, which they believed would provide for substantial increases in wages for all

workers on the line, but they accepted the ruling with good grace on the recommendation of Robert Brynn of Chicago, business agent for the Electrical railroad employes.

The maximum wage provided under the finding is that of 78 cents an hour for motormen and regular conductors. Collector conductors will continue to receive 65 cents an hour and laborers and others less skilled are to be paid 48 cents an hour. Ticket agents will receive \$110 a month.

The arbitration board which arrived at the wage scale was composed of O. Davis Ziniring, a statistician of Chicago representing the employes; Bernard J. Fallon, vice president of the railroad, representing the company and Judge William J. Lindsey of Chicago as the arbiter.
