## Motorists in U. S. in Year Average 571 Gals. of Gasoline Is Report

Each autoist in the United States last year used an average of 571 gallons of gasoline per motor vehicle and paid an average of \$18.36 gasoline tax, according to estimates of the American Motorists association.

The highest per capita gasoline tax was paid by the autoists of New Mexico, paying an average of \$37, based on a 5 cent per gallon tax, and consuming an average of 740 gallons of gasoline. The lowest was Massachusetts paying an average gasoline tax of \$8 per motor vehicle, based on a two-cent tax, using an average of 400 gallons of gasoline per motor vehicle.
