Hold Mission at Holy Cross Church March 23 to April 6

A mission will be given in the Holy Cross Catholic church, Deerfield, by the Rev. T. J. Treacy and will open Sunday, March 23 and conclude Sunday, April 6.

The first week will be devoted to the women and the second week to the men.

The object of a mission is to offer extraordinary opportunities for hearing the Word of God and for worthily receiving the sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist. Everybody making the mission should attend mass and the hours for mass are Sundays at the usual hours, 8 and 10, week days 6 and 8 o'clock. Instructions will be given by the missionary at all the masses on Sunday as well as on week days. An instruction on the Rosary will be given every evening at the beginning of devotions at 8 o'clock.

Sermons will be preached at the high mass on Sundays and every evening during the mission except Saturday.

Beginning Tuesday afternoon of each week confessions will be heard every day between 4 and 6 o'clock; every night after the devotions, beginning Tuesday night, and every morning after the mission masses, beginning Wednesday morning.

There will also be a class of instruction conducted, time and place to be announced by the missionary. This class is for adult Catholics who have not gone to confession nor communion nor been confirmed and for non-Catholics, who wish to take up a study of the Catholic religion or who wish to inquire into it.

An invitation is extended to both Catholics and non-Catholics of the community to attend this mission and to hear Rev. Treacy, who is a very eloquent speaker and whose sermons are most interesting as well as highly instructive.
