Find Burned Torso of Girl in Cottage Ruins at Deep Lake; Mystery

Although science has sifted a series of clues from the ashes of the Deep Lake cottage that served as the funeral pyre of a murdered girl, Friday night, which may determine her identity, officials hold little hope that her slayer will be brought to justice.

The murderer, attempting the 100 per cent perfect crime, apparently did his work well in the opinion of Dr. J. L. Taylor, county coroner, who in an examination of the body Saturday afternoon established beyond doubt that it was that of a girl and that she had been murdered but a few hours before her charred torso was found in the smoking ruins of the cottage. The theory of the police is that she was connected with some gang of racketeers.

The extent to which the body was burned will make definite identification impossible and would prevent the prosecution from presenting the corpus delicti necessary to obtain a conviction in a murder case, in the opinion of the coroner.

Girl, Blonde and Youthful
Science, however, through the co-operative efforts of Dr. Taylor and Major Calvin Goddard, director of the crime detection laboratory of Northwestern university, has disclosed some facts that may assist the authorities in determining the identity of the victim. Examination of the body showed her to have been about 5 feet 5 inches in height, about 133 pounds in weight, and between 20 and 30 years old. A scorched hair removed from the ashes was that of a blonde woman, who wore her hair long; a fragment of scorched cloth was revealed as having been blue taffeta.

D. H. Lawrence

The recent death of D. H. Lawrence, noted English novelist, poet, and painter, moves one to review his career. He was born in the coal mining section of north England. Winning scholarships and working while in school, he managed to get an education. He began writing while he was very young. His genius was immediately recognized though some of his work was censored.

At Nottingham university Lawrence met Frieda von Richtofen, daughter of a former governor of Alsace-Lorraine and sister of the Lieutenant Richtofen, who became the almost legendary German ace of the war. The English miner's son married the German Baroness in 1914.

Lawrence was never in robust health; for two years he lived in New Mexico near Sante Fe. He died at Nice, and will be buried in Venice.

He has 21 volumes to his credit. One of the best known is "Sons and Lovers." It is a story of filial and maternal devotion, presenting a vivid picture of the life of the English coal mines.
