City and suburban schools will take an important part in the show for the first time. 30 suburban schools, under the jurisdiction of County Superintendent E. J. Tobin, will display miniature models of homes and surrounding gardens, upon which they have been working for two months, studying both architectural and landscape principles.

These models together with 37 similar ones made by women's clubs and garden clubs, will be assembled in a model suburban village, designed by Jacob L. Crane, Jr., of Highland Park which will illustrate the newest ideas in city planning for residential sections. This model of a complete village, with an unique arrangement of streets, parkways, and park area, will be worked out in minute detail on the scale of one quarter inch to a foot. Trees, shrubs, lawns, and flowers will be represented accurately.
