

ROAD PROGRAM IS APPROVED BY STATE

Lake Co. Plan Gets O.K. of Illinois Dept.; Bond Issue Vote April 29

The approval of the proposed Lake county \$1,250,000 road bond program by the state department of highways was received last week-end by the county supervisors.

Frank T. Sheets, head of the department, telegraphed the board of the acceptance of the plans and stated that a letter covering this phase of the project would follow.

It was necessary for the state to concur in the engineering and the general layout of the plans to prevent conflict with state programs, it was explained.

This was the last step necessary before the board can submit the program to the voters at a special election that will be held April 29.

Covers 37 Miles

The program, as approved by the board and state department, covers 37 miles of paving in all sections of the county, including the completion of the long planned road entering the south end of the county at Buffalo road and extending north through Mundelein, Druce lake and to Wedges corners to connect with Millburn road and then north to the Wisconsin line at Pikesville.

The bond issue, according to R. M. Lobdell, would complete the secondary system of highways connecting village and larger communities of the county with the principal system.

To Pay Bonds

The money for the retirement of the bonds would come from the gasoline tax. The county gets its share from the state based on the number of automobile licenses issued in the county.

In addition to the county program the state has a 62 mile road project including an entirely new north and south route through the country as its part of the Lake county highway development.

Mr. Wister's professional work and lectures have taken him to all parts of the country, so that he understands the different climates and the different types of plants and plant treatments for those climates. He never gives a stereotyped speech, but in every case adapts his talk to the special conditions which exist in the community where he is speaking. He has lectured in all the large cities in America and in hundreds of smaller communities from coast to coast.

When Mr. Wister speaks on Iris, on shrubs, on planting the home grounds, he draws, not only from study but from his experience in his own garden in Germantown, Philadelphia. He has there over 300 varieties of Iris, of Daffodils, and of tree and Herbaceous peonies and over 100 varieties of lilacs, besides hundreds of other beautiful flowers.

His knowledge of community gardens and public gardens is also first hand. He is at present in charge of the preparations for a new Arboretum on the ground of Swarthmore college, Swarthmore, Pa.
