North St. Johns avenue are receiving congratulations on the birth of a baby boy, born March 16 at the Highland Park hospital.

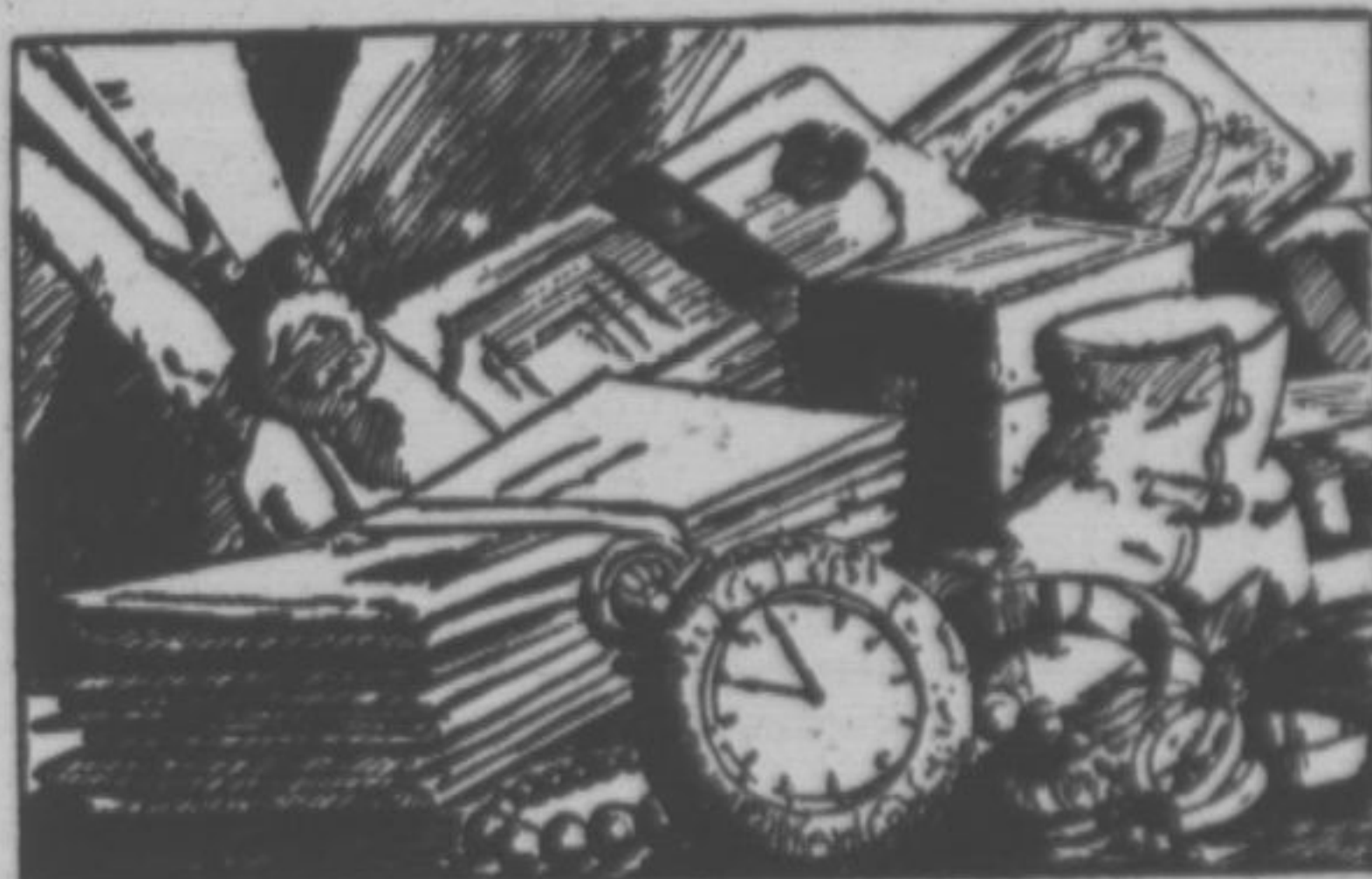
