tion had become a world power!

The strength of democracy lies in the ability to meet new situations. Reconstruction, finance, monopolies, and Americanization of immigrants had been national problems in preceding years, but stabilization of currency by national and federal-reserve banks under the gold standard, determination of the obligations of capital and labor by legislature and court, and expansion of education were twentieth century solutions. We were making this the age of applied science—skyscrapers, electric lights, Panama Canal, automobiles, airplanes, wireless—when from out of the unknown came war! Great empires fought in a death struggle. Neutralities disregarded, atrocities perpetrated, treaties ignored, we, too, entered the World War to change it to a conflict for democracy, a War to end Wars. Then followed the Armistice, peace, and readjustment. Readjustment brought restriction of immigration, woman suffrage, and prohibition. Recognizing our responsibility to posterity, we have sponsored peace conferences and disarmament movements. As a world power we seek world democracy.
