# INFANT WELFARE CAMPAIGN BEGINS

#### Local Center Starts Drive for Funds; Excerpts from Two Reports Given

The Highland Park-Ravinia Center of Infant Welfare launched its annual drive for financial support at a luncheon for the drive committee on Monday, March 24, at the home of Mrs. Walter Rutledge. Mrs. Eugene S. Talbot, president of the Woman's Auxiliary, was present and spoke of her great satisfaction in the fine record this center has made during these first years of growth and her confidence that it should this year make an even better report.

Dr. Heyworth Sanford, medical director of Infant Welfare, then gave a very interesting and forceful talk on the work of the organization.

The center is asking that the people of Highland Park and Ravinia read the following excerpts from the annual report of the Infant Welfare organization carefully and also the attached excerpts from Dr. Sanford's paign for funds. report:

From Statistical Report

The statistical report shows that in 1929 the society took care of 14,-390 infants and pre-school children, of 1,300 expectant mothers and that the staff would have made 106,118 cent. In our pre-school group 3,285 children were cared for with a mortality of 0.54 per cent. The child from two to six years has frequently been called "the child of the neglected Deerfield will welcome the announceage." The baby before he can walk and talk is usually well cared for, for there is something in the helplessness of the infant that appeals to the parent, but when the child learns to walk and is out from under foot he is usually left to shift for himself. We have found that the two chief contributory causes of mortality in this group are malnutrition, due to faulty feeding, and contagious diseases.

Medical Offical's Report

From Dr. Sandford's report the fol-

lowing is taken: "In the pre-natal ences 1,290 deliveries, 57 per which had hospital care; 31 cent had care from the out-patient departments of the hospitals which co-operate with us, and 7 per cent were cared for by private physicians. Of the 57 per cent in hospitals, the Presbyterian hospital delivered 21 per cent, and the Lying-In hospital 10 per cent. This means that 95 per cent of the mothers under our care were in medical hands, which resulted in a maternal mortality of none.


