A CHAT WITH LOCAL MOTORISTS

Too many mechanics, when engine operating troubles are reported, immediately start fussing with the carburetor without first diagnosing the real trouble. Once in a while, enriching the mixture will produce fair results—whereas a cure of the underlying trouble would be a lasting benefit.

Carburetors as a rule, do not give trouble on their own account, but are the innocent victims of troubles of other units of your car, such as water and dirt in the fuel lines or screens; faulty spark plugs, distributor, wiring, piston rings; leaky valves; tappet adjustments; manifold gasket leaking, etc.

When a carburetor is properly adjusted, it is rarely necessary to change the adjustment unless there is a radical change in the grade of fuel used, or you take your car to a different altitude.

Mechanics employed here follow an iron clad rule—never to change the adjustment of carburetor until the following points have been checked: test the compression of cylinders, clean spark plugs and adjust gaps, clean breaker points and adjust timing of motor, see that gasoline lines are free from dirt and water, check vacuum system, check intake gasket for air leaks, check automatic spark advance, for advanced and retarded spark, examine for proper adjustment of tappets.

Adjusting a carburetor requires the services of a skilled mechanic, thoroughly conversant with carburetors, and should not be attempted by any other.

He began his education in the little town of Red Bluff, California. Worked his way through high school, got a scholarship, and went up to the University of California at Berkeley. Summer times he drove a header in the grain fields. Does any one know what a header is? Well, its an amazing big machine hauled by a drove of horses, that cuts, thrashes and bags the wheat. The man who drives the header sets the pace and keeps the whole harvesting gang in operation. It is good preparation for keeping a system of schools running!

Worth Is Recognized

The University recognized Cooper's teaching talent and asked him to assist in the history department. Then the earth quake, and young Cooper was made secretary of the General Relief Office in San Francisco under the U. S. War Department.

Next we find him with the Western Electric company, one promotion following another, but before he was 25, Cooper realized that his real interest lay in education. He turned his back on the commercial world and began 25 years of work as an educator. Here is a list of some of his activities during those years:

Political Signs Will be Taken from Routes
