## DR. COOPER SPEAKS AT H. S. APRIL 10TH

One of Foremost American Educators to Address P. T. A.;  
Who He Is

Speaking as one of the foremost leaders of American education, Dr. William John Cooper, U. S. Commissioner of education, will address the annual joint meeting of Parent-Teacher associations on "Democracy and the High School" Thursday evening, April 10, at 8 o'clock in the Deerfield-Shields high school auditorium.

Parent-Teacher associations and other organizations of the entire high school district have united in bringing Dr. Cooper to Highland Park.

Dr. Cooper's vast experience in American education extends over all grades and kinds of school work from the elementary to the university grades. At present he is deeply interested in a survey of secondary education, the extension of modern inventions such as the "talkie" in the teaching of certain subjects, and in the equalization of educational opportunities throughout the nation.

## All Citizens Ticket Candidates Winners in Township Election

In the Deerfield township election April 1, A. W. Vercoe and Paul L. Udell were re-elected assistant supervisors, Albert Larson, town clerk and Martin Ringdahl, assessor, all without opposition. Mr. Larson polled the highest vote, with 407. The vote for the other was as follows: Vercoe, 386; Udell, 326; Ringdahl, 390 according to the unofficial count.

In the race for constable to fill a vacancy Samuel Shawcroft was successful, polling 373 votes, while his opponent, Geno Palmieri, whose name was written in on the ballot, received 191. In the Highwood precinct Palmieri received 178 votes and Shawcroft 101, according to unofficial figures.

### 3 School Board Members Give Views on Lake Forest Separation

The following regarding the proposed separation of Lake Forest territory from the Deerfield-Shields Township high school district, signed by three members of the high school board of education, is furnished the Press with the request that it be printed... The Press assumes no responsibility in the matter, but its columns are open at all times to discussion of matters of community interest, providing the contributions are signed by those responsible therefor.

The withdrawal of Lake Forest from the Deerfield-Shields Township High School District as seen by three members of the High School Board of Education:

Many taxpayers are asking what will be the effect of the withdrawal of Lake Forest from the Deerfield-Shields Township High school district, in case such withdrawal is consummated. It therefore seems best to the undersigned to make the following brief statement:

In 1907 by petition and unanimous affirmative vote in the southern part of Shields township and by a concurrent affirmative vote in Deerfield township, that part of Shields stretching from the south boundary line at Farwell's crossing to the northern limits of Lake Forest and west to Libertyville township was annexed to the Deerfield Township High school district and the name changed to Deerfield-Shields.

In recent years, since the union of the townships, the City of Lake Forest has annexed a large amount of territory in the Deerfield-Shields district to the west and south until at present the city embraces more than a third of the Deerfield-Shields Township High school district, including large slices of the towns of East Deerfield and West Deerfield, both in the original Deerfield township.

In this Deerfield township area, al-
