Ravinia Garden Club Has Fine Exhibit at Central States Show

Mrs. Robert McKnight of the Ravinia Garden club, assisted by Mrs. Milton Hardacre, Mrs. W. C. Atwell and Mrs. W. F. Ross, have built a terrace for the Central States Flower and Garden show, which opens Saturday, April 5, at the Chicago Stadium. A wall of antiqued, white-washed brick and a stairway of exquisite ornamental iron form the background for forced ornamental crabtrees, birches and evergreens. A miniature garden in lovely tones of rose and pink adds charm to this setting of an afternoon tea party.

The vast arena, where 23,000 boxing fans cheered their favorite battles only a few days ago is transformed. The ring where the boxers struggled has disappeared and in its place there is a beautiful cool looking "green" garden. Other full size gardens occupy the rest of the main floor, while the balconies that seated thousands have become a double series of terraces overlooking the panorama of gardens.

Distant points have contributed material for the show. The Milles fountain was specially brought from Sweden by the Lake Forest Garden club to be placed as the central feature of its show garden. The north Wisconsin woods yielded two carloads of trees to form the background of the full size gardens, with other trees brought in from Kentucky and Missouri forests. Truck loads of sphagnum moss and bog plants from Michigan are used effectively while a large shipment of Irises are leaving San Francisco by aeroplane on Thursday to arrive in time for installation in a garden Friday. On that day, the special train bringing the exhibits of a number of leading growers of the New York metropolitan district is scheduled to arrive and thousands of blooms, growing plants and shrubs are coming to the Stadium from scores of Illinois greenhouses, where they have been forced for the big show.

At the same time the Illinois garden club women are busy moving in and installing their entries, more than 300 in number, and representing 90 communities.

Shadow Boxes Charming Feature Central States Flower Show April 5-13

Shadow Boxes have always been very charming and appealing at a flower show, but this year's display at the Central States Garden and Flower Show, to be held at the Chicago Stadium April 5 to 13 promises to be lovelier, and a great deal more interesting than at any of the previous shows.

Atwill, Mrs. M. Hardacre, and Mrs. Wm. Ross have spent a great deal of time planning the "Porch" decoration and the club feels sure they will develop something unusual and artistic. Plans for the "Garden Gate" have been completed and Mrs. F. Gault and her committee, Mrs. R. A. Bryant, Mrs. E. E. Leonard and Mrs. R. G. Maws are confident that they have something "different" as well as an appropriate Ravinia planting. Mrs. Dudley Crafts Watson's "special occasion" table, set with her own lovely accessories is sure to be very charming and individual. Working with her are Mrs. E. A. Harrington, Mrs. A.
