In Illinois a state-wide primary election is held on Tuesday, April 8, for the nomination of state and county candidates from United States senator down to county superintendents of schools, and those nominated in the primaries will be candidates on their respective tickets in the biennial elections to be held in November.

In Lake county chief interest is centered in the contests for nomination for several county offices on the Republican ticket and there is also special interest in some of the more important candidates for nomination for state offices.

More Than 2,300 Sign Lake Forest Petition to Leave High School

The petition circulated in Lake Forest over last week-end in favor of detaching the territory in that city from the Deerfield-Shields Township high school and establishing a community high school in Lake Forest was signed by more than 2,300 legal voters in that city, circulators report. As there are at the utmost not more than 2,800 voters in Lake Forest, the number of signatures greatly exceeded the two-thirds of the legal voters as required by law. More would have been obtained, the circulators declare, had not many voters been still absent at their winter homes. The petition has been filed with the county superintendent of schools, who under the law is empowered to act in the premises.
