PLAN NEW BUILDING FOR PUBLIC LIBRARY

Handsome Structure to Be Built This Year on Laurel Ave.; Description

This week the Press shows upon its cover page a drawing of the new public library building, and during the present season contracts are to be let and work begun upon the structure which will be located upon the present library site.

The library property, recently extended by adding 60 feet on the west, now comprises a tract 185 feet on Laurel avenue and about 250 feet in depth. With the Park board in possession of that portion of the block between the library and St. Johns avenue, the city will be assured of a beautiful area, 275 feet by 250, suitably landscaped and occupied by but one building, the public library, which will be placed in a slightly location a little west of the present building.

Adds to City's Beauty

This public improvement, added to the adjoining new city hall site and building, will contribute in a large way to the more beautiful Highland Park in which all our citizens are interested.

Holmes & Flinn, the architects, have given much study and great care in the development of the plans and have been in constant communication with the building committee, of which Mr. J. B. Garnett is the chairman, also with the library staff, that the building may be not only beautiful but adapted in the highest degree possible to the purpose it is to serve.

ANNUAL CLEAN-UP OF CITY SHORTLY

Week of April 27 to May 3 Is Designated; Better Homes Boosters Aid

The city administration has designated the week of April 27 to May 3 as annual Clean-Up Week and announces that collections will be made on certain days in certain districts. No ashes will be hauled away by the city trucks, and all tins, cans and other rubbish must be placed in containers and put out on parkways. The days of collection in the several districts are:

Monday, April 28—from Vine street north to city limits.

Tuesday, April 29 — from Vine avenue to Laurel avenue

Wednesday, April 30—from Laurel avenue to Lincoln avenue.

Thursday, May 1 — from Lincoln avenue to Roger Williams avenue.

Friday, May 2—from Roger Williams avenue to the county line.
